EASY WAYS TO TELL TIME

Possession of Watch or Clock Is by No Means Necessary, as This Article Shows.

A boy who does not own a watch need not go without any knowledge of the time of day. There is a boy who works in a wheat elevator in an lowa town, and this is how he manages it. Other Parts That Owners Need to Understand




