MUST RETRACT.

Statements made by Rev. W. E. Millson, formerly of Stratford, during a sermon in Grace Methodist church, St. Thomas, last Sunday evening, are declared to be a violation of the provisions of the Defence of the Realm Act, and Major Corrie, C. O., of the 25th Regiment, has notified the reverend gentleman that if the utterances credited to him are not retracted, prosecution will follow. The statement which objection was taken to was to the effect that officers going to England and later returning home and resigning, did not have a yellow streak up their back, but were yellow from their heels up, and should be occupying a cell. Several officers in St. Thomas, who were unable to get over to France, have returned and retired to civilian life. They feel this is a grave injustice.—Stratford Herald.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 00 per acre. Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain Districts. Price \$3 00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

HAIG'S KEY TO BAPAUME

British Take Village of Irles—Advantage on Three-mile Front

Official statement from British headquarters reads: "We attacked and captured the village of Irles and its neighboring defenses. The advance was made to extend over a front of over three miles. We have taken a considerable number of prisoners, of whom more than 100 already have reached the collecting stations. Four trench mortars and fifteen machine guns were captured. Our casualties were slight. Yesterday an aerial patrol of our machines was engaged heavily by a strong hostile formation. Four of our aeroplanes failed to return; one of the enemy machines is known to have been brought down." The report from British headquarters in France Sunday night reads: "The total prisoners taken in yesterday's successful operations against Irles numbered three officers and 289 men." The British are now holding a formidable mass of trenchworks, which virtually form the key to Bapaume. That powerful position, together with the network of communications connecting it with the territory to the north and east, is beginning to be outflanked from the north-west. From this direction the sole obstacle faced by the British is the strong position of Greveliers, supported on the south by entrenchments in the Bois de Loupart.

Motors For Freighters

Starting Type of Vessel to Counteract Submarine Menace

A plan whereby cargo tonnage can be created in the United States and Canada "faster than Germany can sink it" has been devised by F. Huntington Clarke, the eminent American engineer. Mr. Clarke's plan contemplates the construction of a great number of wooden vessels of 1,000 tons, to be motor propelled, with a speed of from nine to fourteen knots. These vessels, he asserts, can be built at small cost and by men of little skill. Each vessel would be mastless, smokeless and of diminutive size, and would have such low visibility as compared with the great steel steamers now afloat that it could be seen by a submarine at only one-third the distance. In addition, the vessels, would offer a smaller mark, would be more easily manoeuvred in event of attack, and because of their small draught of from eleven to thirteen feet, torpedoes that ordinarily would sink the larger vessels of steel construction would "pass idly beneath them."

Build Ships For Britain

Canadian Shipyards to Construct Steel Steamers

An extensive program of shipbuilding for the British Government in Canada is in contemplation, announces a London cable. The despatch adds: "If the plans which are now in view are carried out successfully the existing shipyards in Canada may all be utilized for the construction of steel steamers of large carrying capacity, while new industries along a large scale. It is learned that the British Government, in this way, is acting through the Imperial Munitions Board, and there is reason to believe that, with the available resources of raw material, there may be developed in the Dominion a steel shipbuilding industry equalling in extent the vast enterprises of the munitions business."

Carranza Elected President

Gen. Venustiano Carranza was elected Sunday President of Mexico by what is believed to have been the largest vote ever cast in the Republic. Although the voters had the privilege of writing in or declaring any name they desired, General Carranza received all but a few scattered ballots. The estimated vote cast runs all the way from several hundred thousand to 1,000,000. Mexico will now have a constitutional president for the first time since 1911, when Francisco I. Madero received more than 3,000,000 votes. His election to the Presidency marks the climax of the efforts of General Carranza, who took the field against Huerta Feb. 19, 1913, after Huerta had seized the executive power.

Civilians For Nation's Defence

The salient feature of the bill introduced by M. Clement, Minister of Commerce and Agriculture, proposed the giving to the French Government of the right to mobilize all able-bodied males between the ages of sixteen and sixty not now serving in the army, who might be assigned to such work for the national defence as their fitness and domicile made most advantageous. Farmers or other persons in occupations directly concerned with the national defence would not be mobilized, and public officials and Government employes whose services are indispensable would be left in their present posts.

Severed Arm Restored

A despatch from London says a son of the Hon. J. O'Grady, a member of Parliament, was wounded several months ago in France in such manner that his arm had to be amputated. The surgeons cut off the arm, removed the shattered bone and then put the arm back again, setting the bone and sewing the tendons. The arm has now healed and is gaining strength. The patient can use it effectively.

Announcement was recently made by the Admiralty that there have been sunk by submarines in the Mediterranean eight steamships and seven sailing vessels of more than 40,000 tons.

Great Britain will provide for the burial in single graves of all overseas soldiers who die there, land being acquired for the purpose, to be held in perpetuity. The British Government had expressed its willingness to purchase the Canadian wheat crop of 1917 at rates somewhat below the prevailing market quotations. Funds for friendless prisoners of war from the sale of Lord Northcliffe's "At the War," has exceeded \$500,000.
