WILL ASSIST URBAN POULTRY KEEPERS

The present year will see a great increase in the number of urban poultry keepers. The almost prohibitive prices of eggs and poultry during the past winter have caused many consumers to seriously consider the home production of these very necessary and useful commodities. It is important also that any efforts put forth in this direction result satisfactorily.

Many difficulties present themselves in attempting to rear chickens successfully on a small city lot. Experience has shown that the best way for urban poultry keepers to enter the poultry business is by the purchase of pullets in the fall. Well matured pullets are the most reliable winter egg producers and if well cared for will not only produce plenty of fresh eggs for the breakfast table but also return a reasonable profit on the expenditure entailed.

Plan Proposed

Ordinarily, well matured pullets are rather scarce and difficult to obtain in the fall of the year. It is believed, however, if the matter were taken up systematically by poultry Associations and, incidentally, serve as a means of increasing interest in the poultry industry. Practically every large town and city has its local poultry Association. It is suggested that each Association give some publicity to the suitability of thrifty well matured pullets for profitable winter egg production and advertise the fact that the Association is prepared to constitute itself a medium to arrange for the hatching and rearing of pullets this spring and for their delivery in the fall. It could be announced that orders would be taken during the month of April and the first part of May. All those desiring pullets in this way could be required to join the Association and make a small deposit covering the number required.

The Association could then make such arrangements as might be necessary with nearby Co-operative Associations, farmers and breeders for the growing of the pullets, a minimum price to be decided upon for the different breeds and varieties. In the fall these could be assembled at some central depot in each locality and the distribution made in time to permit of the proper housing of the stock in permanent winter quarters before the severe weather set in, say by the last of October.

Federal Assistance

In order that greater effectiveness may be given to this proposal, the Dominion Live Stock Branch is prepared to extend, to all Associations qualifying under these provisions, the same assistance that is given to Associations desiring to purchase other kinds of pure bred live stock, namely, the payment of reasonable travelling expenses, during the time required to conclude the purchase and transport the stock to destination, of representatives of Associations, in any section of Canada, driving to purchase pullets in lots of 300 or more. Should it be desired, the Live Stock Commissioner will also nominate a suitable person who will be directed to accompany this representative and assist him as far as possible in the selection and shipping of the pullets.

In the general interests of the poultry industry throughout the Dominion and the urgent need this year for increased production of eggs and poultry and the releasing thereby of a large surplus for export to Great Britain, it is hoped that as many Associations as possible will take advantage of this proposition. All Associations desiring to become active in this direction are requested to write the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa, at once for further advice and instruction in the matter.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS. The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain Districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

RUSSIA'S WARNING

Great Numbers of German Troops Massed on Northern Front

A despatch from London says: Alluding to the military situation in Russia and the effect of the revolution on the men at the front, Reuter's Petrograd correspondent says: "War Minister Guchkov's statement that the foe is at the gate is no mere figure of speech. The slightest relaxation of vigilance and the enemy would be at Petrograd." The correspondent then cautiously refers to the repercussive action on the troops of the consciousness that the army has been the arbiter of Russia's destiny, which has manifested itself in demands incompatible with military discipline, and says that already there is news from various fronts of the prevalence of "second thoughts." He issues a proclamation warning the people of the menace of spies seeking to uncover secrets of the national defence. The concentration of these spies in Petrograd was pointed to as one element of danger against which steps were immediately necessary, while the other menace was named as the concentration by the Germans of "great quantities of munitions, supplies and men" on the Russian northern front. Other despatches told of a conference between Gen. Korniloff, the new commander of the troops in the Petrograd district, with the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates, concerning the German concentration, along this front, and of a great meeting of soldiers on the Riga front attended by Gen. Dimitrieff and delegates of the Duma at which it was resolved unanimously to strain every effort for the defence of Russia.

STRAFING CANADIANS

Huns Wake Up On Canadian Front—Flying Men Busy

A Despatch from Canadian Headquarters in France reads: As his retreat in the Valley of the Somme weakens the enemy begins to wake up again on the Canadian front. His patrols are increasingly vigilant, and his artillery, which for a time was so quiescent as to induce doubt as to whether he meant to fight or withdraw, is now returning the fire of the Canadian batteries with new vigor. Aerial observation is also better and keeps our flying men and Archiefs busy. Men along the front are greatly heartened by the news that the enemy is at least heading for home, though such wanton destruction as cutting down fruit trees angers them almost as much as if Germans were ravaging Niagara Peninsula. The way in which all British troops begin to regard the soil of France, in general and home even more intimate, especially if Russia, France's other ally, becomes a constitutional monarchy or a republic, and is modernized industrially. These matters are far more discussed at the front than even the progress of the war. The great events transpiring south of Arras have made most people optimistic, and once more the cry is heard "Christmas in Canada."

Camps For Canadian Airmen

Borden, Deseronto and Vancouver to House 1,000 Aviators

The newly-organized Canadian Aviation Aid Club met last week at Toronto, with Mrs. Henry Duggan in the chair. Mr. Paul Meredith, Lieutenant of the Royal Flying Corps, returned from the front, told something of the needs of the 400 men at the R.F.C. barracks on Givens Street. They are entirely under Imperial organization, and do not get the grants the local battalions do for buying things for the men. This is a growing branch of the service, and they hope to have 1,000 aviators by the end of the year. There may be three camps—one at Borden, one at Deseronto, and perhaps one at Vancouver. Mr. Meredith told of the need of a convalescent hospital. Some slight accidents are bound to occur in training, and, while bad cases will be sent to the military hospitals, there should be some place for those slightly injured.

Bombard Macedonian Towns

The official report on the Eastern war theatre read: "No event of importance has occurred. On March 23 a violent bombardment on both sides took place. The enemy directed numerous incendiary shells against Monastir. British hydro-aeroplanes bombed Pradesa, Kenali and Orfano." The enemy communique concerning the engagements of March 20-21 is false. We have maintained all the important positions conquered north of Monastir.

Home For Sick Canadians

Viscount Milner has placed his beautiful house, Sturroy Court, Canterbury, with a residence adjoining, and also a staff of servants, at the disposal of Lady Drummond for the benefit of Canadian officers on sick leave. This place is among the most beautiful in Kent. Officers will be sent there through the Canadian Red Cross London Bureau. Mrs. H. B. Yates, widow of Col. Yates, who died here, will have charge.

Claim 350,000 French Prisoners

A Berlin paper says: Having printed in the French language the names of 350,000 French prisoners of war and the places at which they are being held, the German Government is beginning the publication of the names of French soldiers buried behind the German lines and the location of their graves.

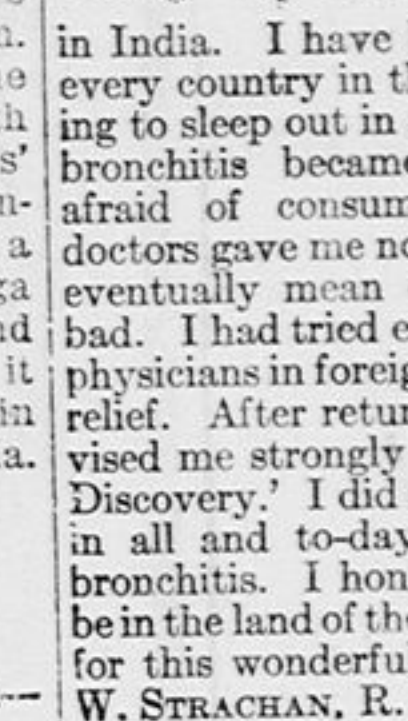

ADJALA FARMER HANGED HIMSELF

William Wilson, an Adjala farmer, living a mile and a half south of Hockley, in a fit of despondency, committed suicide by hanging himself in his driving-shed on Thursday, 28th inst. About the middle of the afternoon he sent his hired man to the town to buy chores, and when the latter returned to the house at six o'clock he found that his employer was not in. Going back to search for him, he was horrified on opening the driving-shed door to see his lifeless body suspended by a rope from a beam. It is probable that Wilson, who was alone in the house when the hired man left to do the chores, went to the driving-shed shortly afterwards and took his life. After securing the rope to the beam, he had stood on a chair to fasten it about his neck, then kicked the chair from under him. Wilson, who was about seventy-three years of age, was highly respected in the community and some years ago served in Adjala township council for several terms. He had been in ill health for a year and at times was melancholy. His wife died some years ago.
