SEVEN YEARS IN THE PEN.

Francis J. Percival McKay, the soldier who cashed three forged cheques in town some months ago, aggregating \$64, was brought from the Guelph prison farm, where he had been serving a term for other offences, by Constable Simpkins, on Thursday last. He came up on forged charges here and was committed to Barrie for trial. On Tuesday he was sentenced to seven years in Kingston penitentiary. He was born in New Zealand 35 years ago. He was in the South African war, but deserted. Since the present war commenced he has joined several battalions. He got to England on one occasion, but was returned as an undesirable. McKay has had many convictions against him in the last 15 years, the majority of them being for forgery. He claims he married an 18-year-old Ottawa girl, but after a few weeks' absence was unable to locate her. Bradford Witness.

WHISKEY BOTTLES FOR CHICKEN FEED

As a sequel to the conviction of the proprietor of the Arlington hotel, Listowel, for selling beer containing six per cent. alcohol, action was taken against the brewer on advice of the License Department, and another fine of \$75 gathered in, making a total of \$208. Inspector Elliott then went to Atwood, where he learned from the Express Co. that a certain nearby farmer had received two cases of whiskey and one of gin, 36 bottles in all. The farmer admitted receipt of the goods, claiming they were for his own use. Sixteen days had passed and the supply had dwindled down to four bottles of whiskey and eight of gin. The farmer claimed the stuff had been consumed by himself, and wife, and son. The inspector then enquired for the empty bottles, and was told they had been ground up and fed to the chickens. Action is likely to follow.

PROVIDE FOR BANNING LIQUOR ADVERTISING

Legislation that will put into the hands of the Ontario License Board control by regulation over newspapers advertising liquor is under consideration, and will probably be introduced when the House takes up the Temperance Act amendments agitation for legislation that would put a curb on newspaper advertising by liquor merchants chiefly operating from Montreal, and the matter was raised in the House a couple of weeks ago. Sir William Hearst intimating that it was under consideration. It is now stated, while direct legislation putting the ban on liquor advertising in the papers will not be introduced, the government will seek to effect that purpose by giving the license board considerable power in regulation to deal with such questions.
