INSPECTS CANADIANS Duke of Connaught Visits Canadian Camp at Witley H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught inspected the Canadian camp at Witley, near Godalming, England, on Saturday. The troops regarded the visit of the Duke as a delicate compliment to their brothers in France, whose prowess has won encomiums from the Empire and its allies. The Duke of Connaught spent two hours inspecting the camp and then witnessed evolutions on the parade ground, including gas drill. He afterwards separately inspected the various units, giving special attention to the infantry battalion recruited mainly from Irishmen in Canada who displayed the colors recently presented to the regiment by the late Duchess.

GIVE BRITAIN \$5,000,000 Generous Acknowledgement of Britain's Protection A report from Cape Town says:—At the South African party congress Saturday, Hon. F. S. Malan, Minister of Mines, announced that the Union Government had decided to grant the Imperial Government one million pounds sterling, in recognition of the protection afforded by the navy, under which exports from South Africa had proceeded as usual, notwithstanding the war.

Two Hospital Ships Sunk The British hospital ship Salta was sunk by a mine in the English Channel on April 10, the War Office announced. Fifty-two persons were drowned. The British hospital ship Gloucester Castle was torpedoed without warning in the English Channel on March 30. All the wounded on the ship were saved.

Frie on Own Troops Despatches from Petrograd says:—Austrian troops engaged with the Russians in Galicia ran up white flags and attempted to go over to the Russian lines, the War Office announced. On being attacked by their own artillery they returned to their trenches.

Cannot Dictate to World The Socialist newspaper Vorwarts of Berlin says editorially: "The German Government must have the courage to tell the German people the whole truth, which is simply that it is impossible to dictate terms of peace to a world of enemies."

ACTIVITY IN BALKANS

Paris Reports Heavy Artillery Fighting on Macedonian Front The report from Paris reads: A local attack attempted by the enemy against Zvora (west of Monastir) Saturday, failed. Very violent artillery activity occurred in the region between the Vardar and Presba Lake, notably in the Cervena-Stena region. The enemy bombardment of Monastir destroyed seventeen houses. Bands of committed, aided by Austrian units, attempted to take the offensive in the region west of Koritza (Albania). They were repulsed. British aeroplanes attacked with success the aviation camp at Drama. Italian aeroplanes repulsed an enemy squadron which attempted to bombard the Italian sector.

Eastern theatre: During the day there was increasing enemy artillery activity in the zone comprised between the Cerna bend and Lake Presba. After a bombardment with poisonous shells enemy detachments attacked last night the Italian positions on Hill 1050. Met by a lively fusillade they were compelled to withdraw. West of Koritza, in the direction of Moshopole, skirmishes took place to our advantage with bands of Albanians supported by Austrians. French aviators bombarded the reticulating centre, Bogdanci, in the Vardar valley.

TURKS DRIVEN BACK

General Maude Draws Enemy Toward Deltawah Official report reads:—General Maude (the British commander) withdrawing his advanced detachments on the right bank of the Diale River, has succeeded in drawing the bulk of the enemy forces on this flank in a south-westerly direction, toward Deltawah. The fighting had to be temporarily suspended, owing to the mirage, but upon this lifting our offensive continued. Our guns, with the able assistance of our aeroplanes, rapidly asserted their superiority. The enemy was driven from his advanced positions near Ghallyeh, ten miles north-east of Deltawah. We are following up the Turkish forces, which are falling back toward Dolys Abbs. It is ascertained that the Turks lost 700 wounded, 200 Turkish dead being found on the battlefield.

CANADIANS AS NAVAL MEN

Young Canadian Enjoys Hunting the Sub. Report from Ottawa says: There are now 376 young Canadians, in the patrol service of the British Navy familiarly known as the submarine chasers. Of these 264 are sub-lieutenants and 112 are chief motorboat men and motorboat men. The sub-lieutenants are officers of the craft and the motorboat men are the mechanics in charge of the engines. Reports received by the naval service department are very laudatory of the work of the Canadians. They have all "made good" and are a great credit to the Dominion. Of the 112 men in charge of the motors, 43 are from British Columbia, 20 coming from Vancouver alone, 32 from Ontario, of whom 11 are from Toronto, and 6 from Ottawa, 21 from Quebec, of whom 15 are from Montreal, 9 from Alberta, 4 from Saskatchewan, and 3 from Manitoba.

ANOTHER TRAGEDY IN TORONTO AS TROOP TRAIN PULLS OUT One boy was killed and two suffered skull fractures when the Grand Trunk International Limited, westbound, ran into a group of children, who were standing on the west track between Queen street and Logan avenue, early Friday night, waving farewells to an outgoing troop train. The dead boy is Malcolm Foster, aged 6, and the injured are Melville George, aged 13, and Edward Schaenewys, aged 11. There were a number of women and children on the track, but all except the victims stepped off when they heard the warning whistle of the incoming train. The gatekeeper at Queen street had set the semaphore to prevent accidents at the crossing, but the children were struck north of the warning signal. The engineer brought his train to a stop within 60 yards of the scene of the accident, otherwise further fatalities would probably have occurred.
