British Capture and Hold Gonnelleu-French Make Further Progress North of the Aisne

The British troops fighting in France have made additional gains between Arras and St. Quentin and also south-east of Loos, in the latter district taking prisoners. The British official reports follow: Sunday evening-"Our troops have made further progress east of the Havrincourt wood and have carried the southern portion of Trescault village. Saturday Night-"To-day the enemy made an unsuccessful attempt to recover the village of Gonnelieu, captured last night. His attacking troops, caught by our artillery fire, were driven back, leaving many dead in front of our position. We gained ground during the day by local fighting along the north bank of the Scarpe, eastward of Fampoux, and advanced our lines slightly north-west of Lens. In this latter area two other German counterattacks were successfully beaten off. During the night a small party of the enemy raided one of our crater posts south of Ypres. An enemy party attempted to enter our trenches in the neighborhood of Fauquissart, but was repulsed. Artillery fire continued on both sides at a number of places during the night."

French Win in Many Places The official communication issued Arrange to visit some of the follow-, by the French war office reads:-"Sunday-Between the Somme and the Oise very active artillery fighting took place during the course of the day south of St. Quentin and north of Urvillers. Between Soissons and Rheims the artillery actions were intermittent in various sectors."

The text of the statement reads:-"In the region south of St. Quentin the artillery bombardment continued rather violent during the night. Between the Aisne and the Chemins des Dames we made new progress to the north of Sancy and Jouy."

Violent Artillery Duels "Between the Somme and the Oise violent artillery duels occurred, especially in the region south of St. Quentin. Between the Aisne and the Chemin des Dames we continued our progress on the plateau north of Sancy. Grenade fighting enabled us to gain ground in the sector of Hurtebise. Our barrage fire broke down four different attempts made by the enemy to debouch from trenches north of Braye-an-Laonnois. In the region of Rheims, in Champagne, there was intermittent artillery fighting, quite spirited at certain points."
