IMPERIAL PREFERENCE

Lloyd George and Bonar Law on Empire Produce

Bonar Law said in the house of commons last week that the imperial war cabinet had unanimously accepted the principle that each part of the empire, having due regard to the interests of our allies, shall give special favorable treatment and facilities to products manufactured in other parts of the empire. He said: "I need not tell the house there is no intention whatever of making any change during the war. The resolution I have read leaves the question open, and does not involve the taxation of food."

Lloyd George speaking at the Guild hall said: "There is no sphere of statesmanship in which there is more need for revised ideas than our attitude towards that great commonwealth of nations of the British Empire. In the past we have treated it as an abstraction, a glorious abstraction, but still an abstraction. The war has shown us all that the empire is a fact, nay, a factor; the most potent factor to-day is the struggle for human liberty."

Continuing he said: "We have decided that in future it is the business of Britain and dominion statesmanship to knit the empire in closer bonds of interest of trade, of commerce, of business and general intercourse in affairs. We have considered this problem and decided that in order to develop these enormous territories in future it is necessary that exceptional encouragement should be given to the products of each part of the empire. The empire has infinite resources of wealth, minerals, food products and every commodity needful for man; and it is obviously advantageous, not merely to the particular country producing these products, but to every other part, including the United Kingdom, that these commodities should be developed to the utmost. This would enrich, strengthen and bind together the empire as a whole."

NEW PARTY LINES COMING

Lloyd George as Prophet—War is Swift Teacher

In his Guild hall speech last week the Premier also said:—"Before the war there were five absolutely independent parties in this country. People are now discovering that none of these had a monopoly of wisdom, or was the sole repository of political sagacity—no, even if the five were put together. The people are realizing that there are more things in heaven and earth than the political philosophy of any of these parties. That is one illusion that we have seen disappear in the lurid fires of war. When, after the war, reconstruction begins, I hope, trust and pray that we are not going to dive into the pigeonholes of party to dust-laden precedents and programs. Let us think out the best methods for ourselves in the face of searching facts of which we knew nothing before the war. We are a thousand years older and wiser since the war. The experience of a generation has been crowded into just a few winters, and we should be unworthy of the great destiny to which Providence has called this generation if we threw away all that for the sake of formulas framed before the flood."

CAN PREVENT FAMINE

Submarine is Worst Problem; but Can be Faced

Premier Lloyd-George, speaking in part on the submarine menace last Friday, said: "Our victory is becoming increasingly assured. The submarine is the worst problem we have to meet, and we mean to do it. Germany means to make the seas absolutely impassable for any craft. That is essential to victory for them. It is essential for victory to us that they should fail. Do not let us minimize the gravity of the situation." He said the farmers were now cultivating 10 per cent. more land than before the war. The farmer had been given a guarantee and so had his laborers and after the feverish activity of the last few months we had a million acres of fresh land under cultivation, meaning an addition of 2,000,000 tons of food. He continued: "We are taking steps now for the harvest of 1918, and not a minute too soon. Three million fresh acres of land are being put into cultivation, and even without a ton of food being brought from abroad no one can starve us. But all must help. You have your rations; keep to them."

BEER AND MARRIAGE

New Regulations for Canadian Soldiers Announced in England

A despatch from London, Eng., on Monday, said:—No bottled beer is to be sold in Canadian regimental institutions. Also with a view to economizing in food, the hours for the sale of food are being curtailed. Separation allowance will only be paid to Canadians marrying more than twenty days after enlistment, if the engagement to marry prior to enlistment is established to the satisfaction of the commanding officers.

Gen. Petain, Chief of Staff

Paris reported on Sunday:—General Petain, who commanded the French army defending Verdun during the critical stages of the battle in February and March, 1916, is to be appointed Chief of Staff at the Ministry of War.

Submarine Menace Grave

Herbert L. Samuel, former home secretary, speaking in London last Saturday on the gravity of the submarine menace, said that the figures he had seen on the sinking of vessels show that the situation is worse than official reports have indicated.

A press correspondent in a despatch from British headquarters, describes the bravery of Newfoundland troops, who left 1,500 Germans dead in one trench alone.

The Berlin Vossische Zeitung announces the death of Vice-Admiral Kaiser von Kaltenfels, Chief of the Austrian Navy Department.

It will take quite a long time to get the place ready, as all the iron bars will have to be removed. In addition to this, more electric lights will be installed. When the work is completed it is expected the returned heroes will have a comfortable home in which to reside while they are regaining their health and strength. There will be accommodation for about 550. There are at the present time about 150 inmates at the reformatory, and they are all being kept in one section.

If you wring a soft cloth out of warm water and place it over a hot water bag filled with hot water, it will cause a steaming cloth, which gives almost instant relief to severe attacks of earache, toothache or neuralgia.
