SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Land Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

PROFESSOR RIETHDORF WAS TREATED SHAMEFULLY

(Toronto Star)

Professor Riethdorf has enlisted as a private soldier in the Army Medical Corps in this city and will, it is expected, proceed overseas in that service at an early date.

Professor Riethdorf was a professor in Woodstock College when the war broke out, and at once began in the press and on the platform, advocating the cause of the Allies, directing his arguments to Canadians of German birth or descent. He is himself a Canadian citizen of German birth, but not of Prussian birth, and with a much better informed antagonism to Prussian autocracy than it is possible for most Canadians to possess.

It might have been supposed that when a man like Professor Riethdorf took the public platform as he did as a Canadian citizen, and incurred the enmity of pro-Germans because of his activities, that the people and the authorities here would have upheld him in his course. It was not done. He was allowed to be crowded aside, by influences that must be bluntly described as pro-German. It is a reproach to this country that such influences were allowed to operate. Professor Riethdorf is now a private in the ranks of the army and is about to leave for the war. He is now in a service where influences have not the nerve to intrude, and where democratic principles and scholarly abilities will be turned to useful account.

"ALEC" MACLAREN IS GONE

(Stratford Herald). A thrill of sincere sorrow passed over the city to-day when the news spread of the passing away in Toronto this week of Mr. A. F. MacLaren, ex-M.P. Though it was known that he was critically ill, his legion of friends could not bring themselves to believe that "Alec" MacLaren was on his death bed. But the big-hearted, whole-souled man has gone, leaving a name that will be ever revered.

No man in the public life of Perth County ever quite equalled "the People's Alec" in popularity. Men were attracted to Mr. MacLaren by his genial personality, and they were held in bonds of close friendship and admiration by the solidity and genuineness of his character. Till his last day in this city, he counted his friends not in scores, but in hundreds, and so it was throughout Western Ontario, over the Dominion, across the border into the United States, and even beyond the broad Atlantic.

Business integrity and energy devoted to the development of the great dairying industry won for him the proud title of "the Cheese King of Canada." Nor was the advantage all with Mr. MacLaren. The dairy interests of the Dominion are deeply in his debt for the impetus afforded the production of first-grade cheese and the advertising of the world over, of Canada's possibilities. Closer at home, the people of North Perth, will long remember with gratitude the high ideals of public service exemplified by the man whom they were proud to honor or term after term as their representative in the highest legislative tribunal in the land. Service was a pleasant duty for Alec MacLaren. Selfishness he knew not. He gave his best for the constituency—and a grateful people will mourn his passing away.

PIVOT TOWNS FALL ON GERMAN FRONT

Canadians Take Arleux village and Position Two Miles in Length—Haig Bends Oppy Line

A Sunday despatch from London reads:—A new British offensive on a tremendous scale is in progress on the French front. The blow was struck over a front of several miles in width. Part of Oppy, six miles east of Arras, and the pivotal point of this defensive sector, is in British hands, together with an entire German trench system a mile in extent to the south of Oppy. All of Arleux, a mile further north of Oppy, has also been taken by the Canadians, who gained positions a mile and a half in length by a depth of a mile. Steward Lyon sends the following to the Canadian press from France:—"In co-operation with the victors of Gavrelle the Canadians have taken Arleux, the spearhead pointing to Vimy, and have broken the defensive line erected there by the Germans, thus performing an important part in disrupting the enemy's plans to prevent the invasion of the plain of Cambrésis. The bite taken out by the Canadians was about 2,500 yards in length, with the penetration of the enemy's line at the deepest point of 1,800 yards.

"In the grey dawn of Saturday morning, after an artillery bombardment of great intensity, the troops advanced under the protection of a barrage which swept the ground through which they had to pass with a hail of steel and attacked the village of Arleux. Going forward in steady waves, each like an incoming tide, encroaching on the defences of the Germans farther than that preceding, our men passed through the remains of what a few days ago were exceedingly strong wire entanglements erected or strengthened since the battle of Vimy by the continual labor of thousands of the enemy and ordered to be held at all costs to prevent the further encroachments of the British army upon the plain towards Douai."

Heavy Fighting near Oppy

The official report from British headquarters in France reads:—"Saturday night—Severe fighting, in which our troops have had the advantage, took place throughout the day from the Scarpe River to the Achelle-Vimy road. We captured Arleux-en-Gohelle and enemy positions on a front of over two miles north and south of the village. Our troops also progressed northeast of Gavrelle and the western slopes of Greenland Hill between Gavrelle and Reuux. South of the river we have gained ground once again delivered many violent counter-attacks with considerable forces and suffered heavily from our artillery and machine gun fire. In the neighborhood of Reuux and Oppy heavy fighting is continuing. Several hundred prisoners were captured by us during the day."

Enemy Resist Stubbornly

"Sunday afternoon—During the night a strong enemy counter-attack upon our new positions north of Arleux-en-Gohelle was broken up by our fire. Fighting continues at several places north of River Scarpe. Sunday night—This morning an enemy trench system south of Oppy was captured on a front of about a mile after heavy fighting. The enemy offered stubborn resistance and delivered several unsuccessful counter-attacks."

Forecasting possibly a resumption of Gen. Nivelle's concerted offensive, the Paris War Office statement on Monday detailed "violent artillery actions" south of St. Quentin, around Troyenne, Craonne, and the regions of Hurduse. British front despatches on Monday spoke of new German long-range cannon now brought up and put into action against the British drive. The intensity of the German fire had likewise increased, although as yet it did not anywhere near approach the violence of the British deluge of steel.

ROUTED GERMAN FLIERS

British Machines Drive Eight Enemy Planes to Earth

A press correspondent writes: The German airmen had one of the greatest surprises of their lives late Friday. The day had been heavily overcast until nearly 6 o'clock in the evening, when the clouds suddenly thinned and the sun broke through. A few German machines had been sighted well back of their lines during the obscured period, but when the sun shone out several enemy squadrons which had been housed all day came out to stretch their wings in the slanting afternoon's rays. They had scarcely taken the air when the British machines pounced upon them, and in the after tea-time fighting that ensued several German machines were seen to crash and eight others to be driven down completely out of control, which are believed to have been destroyed.

RAMSGATE IS SHELLED

Man and Woman Killed—Damage to Property Small

German destroyers attacked Ramsgate, England, last week, according to an official announcement issued by the war office. A large number of shells were fired, but the destroyers were driven off by the fire from the land batteries. One man and one woman were killed during the bombardment, and one man and two women were injured. The greatest damage to property was that done to an inn. Some shells fell on open lands near Broadstairs.

SHOT TO LAST MAN

French Fisherman Massacred by Submarine in Cold Blood

A Sunday report from Paris reads: Twenty-one members of the crews of two French fishing boats who took refuge in the rigging after their craft had been attacked by a submarine off Audienne, were shot to the last man, according to a Nantes despatch to Gaulois. Sixty-three children were left orphans.
