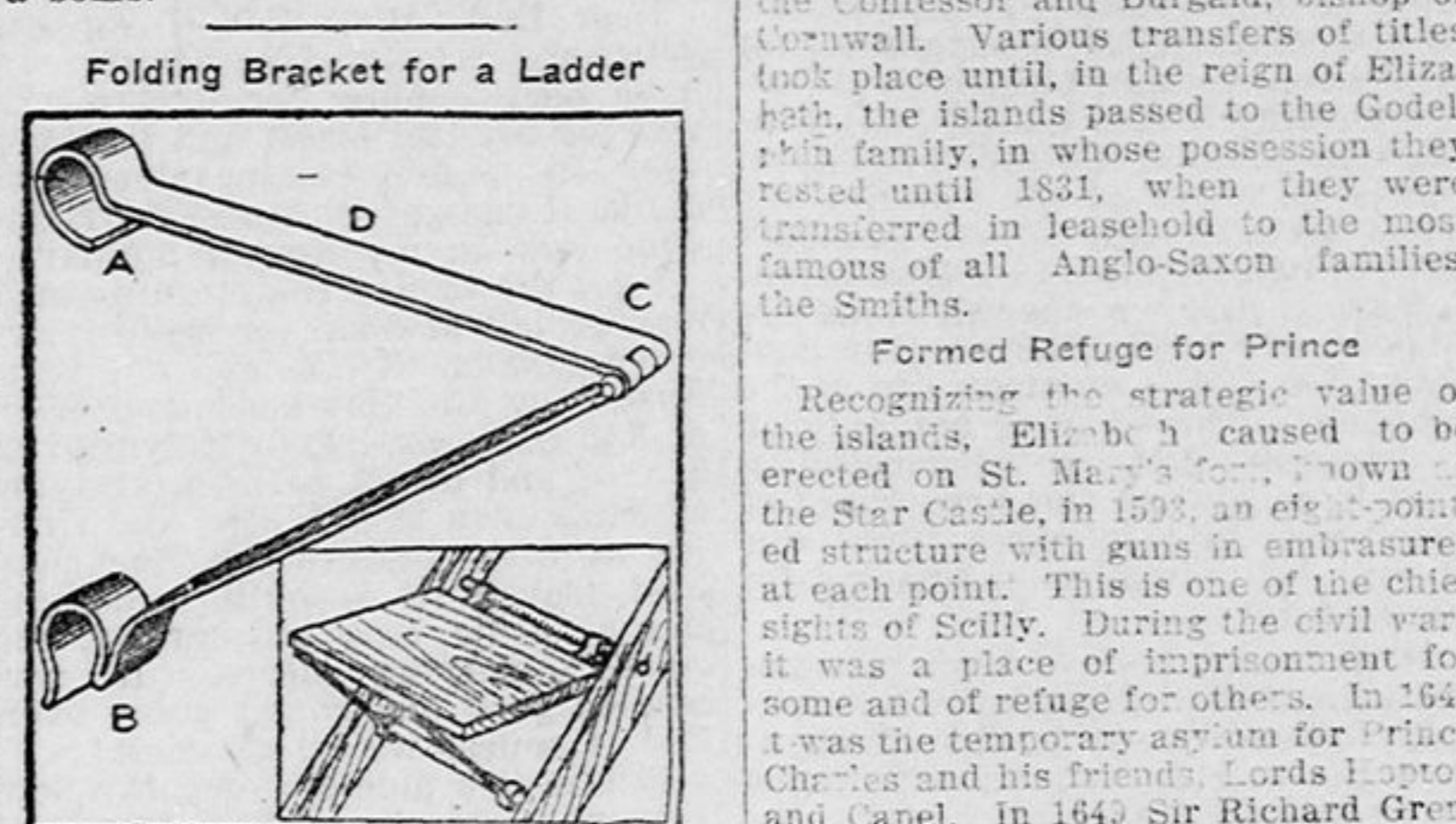

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS**  
 The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject, or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.  
 In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3 per acre. Duties—Residence six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.  
 A settler after obtaining homestead patent, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.  
 Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as resident duties, under certain conditions.  
 When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

## HOW HOUSES EXPLODE

**Western Tornadoes Fling Buildings Bodily into the Air**  
 The most remarkable phenomenon connected with tornadoes (such as have devastated towns in the middle West) is the explosion of houses, which literally burst, scattering their fragments in all directions. Sometimes substantial dwellings are carried high into the air and then explode. It is now understood that this is due to the fact that the "funnel cloud" (revolving at a rate of at least 500 miles an hour) has a vacuum inside. Thus it sucks up everything in its path, even empty wells. It sucks all the air from around a house over which it passes, and the house (a vacuum being thus created outside of it) promptly explodes, owing to the pressure of the air, at thirty pounds to the square inch, from within. The house, in a word, is transformed into a bomb.



Pails, brushes, or other tools and materials used in working from a ladder, may be supported conveniently by on folding brackets like those shown in the sketch. They are hooked to adjoining rungs and a board is fastened across them. When not in use they are folded out of the way, or removed from the ladder. They are made by forming a hinge joint in two strips of iron, as at C. The upper end A and the lower end B are curved to fit the rung without slipping off easily. The upper strip D is drilled to provide a fastening for the shelf.—Popular Mechanics.

## HISTORY OF PEARLS

Date Back as Far as Twenty-Third Century  
 The modern recognition of pearls dates back to about 300 B.C., but they were known to yet older peoples and especially to those of the East," says an author. "The Chinese records go still farther back, and oyster pearls were received as tribute in the twenty-third century B.C. It is probable that they were found in the waters of Ceylon and India two thousand years ago, and the Greeks of course knew the pearl and recognized its value. But it was not until the Roman Empire was beginning to rise that the knowledge of the value of the pearl became general. It seems that in early times Britain played its part in the production of these gems, and Tacitus refers to British pearls, but calls them dull-colored and dirty brown. Origen, on the contrary, declared that the pearls that came from Britain held the second rank in value. It was not, however, until about the twelfth century that pearls were used in England, when they became conspicuous in church ornamentation."

## RENTING THEIR COFFINS

Poor in Mexico use Municipal Coffin Many Times  
 In Mexico many of the poor rent, instead of buy, coffins, and for those who are not even able to pay rental, the municipal authorities supply a casket which is used again and again for such purposes. These publicly owned coffins are merely roughly made boxes with handles at either end. A common practice is for a sturdy, and generally very ragged, peon to carry the burden strapped to his back. On arriving at the burial ground the body is rolled in straw and deposited in a grave, whereupon the wooden box is carried back to the city and held in readiness for the next occasion.

**Origin of "A-1"**  
 Few people when they say of an article of excellent quality that it is A number one, know the origin of the phrase which they are using. It is a classification of wooden ships used by Lloyd's Maritime Insurance association. The letter stands for the construction of the vessel, the whole indicating that the ship is in all respects seaworthy.

**Giant Monkey-Bread Tree**  
 In tropical Africa and the East Indies grows the monkey-bread tree, which is of excessive thickness, measuring often 20 or 30 feet, while its branches are sometimes 60, or 70 feet in circumference. The spreading top of the tree may be 120 or 150 feet across.

## WALKERTON MAN DIES AFTER A BRIEF ILLNESS

James Warren, C.E., of Walkerton died early Friday, quite unexpectedly, having enjoyed good health until a few days ago. He was in his 81st year. He was born near Acton, and moved to Lucknow when a young man, and taught school for a number of years before taking up his profession, when he settled in Kincardine, and lived there until moving to Walkerton about 28 years ago. He was a man of strong convictions, an active temperance worker, and took a great interest in all moral movements. He was a Baptist, and a Liberal in politics. He leaves a widow, who is a sister of Rev. Dr. Johnson, D.D., of Montreal, and Dr. J. Johnson of Toronto, and three daughters, Miss Annes, a teacher, Miss Winnie, a missionary, who is now home on furlough from China, and Miss Ruth, of the Bank of Commerce staff. The remains were taken to Kincardine.

## PREVENTS A SUICIDE

What is believed to have been a deliberate attempt at suicide was made by an unknown woman about 45 years of age, in the Thames river at the Womham street bridge, Ingersoll, early Saturday morning. The woman was discovered in the water by Mrs. Robt. Aisling, who was on her way up town, and who after a struggle succeeded in getting her out of the river. This was only accomplished, however, through Mrs. Aisling's superior strength. In the struggle, the strange woman's clothing were torn, and she exclaimed, "My poor Willie." In reply to enquiries she said Willie had been shot. Nothing is known of the woman, but it is believed her mind may have been affected through grief, probably at having some relative killed or wounded in the war.
