SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject, or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3 per acre. Duties—Residence six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as resident duties, under certain conditions.

THE BAPTIST CONVENTION

The thirtieth annual meeting of the Baptist churches of the Owen Sound Association, was held in the Durham Baptist church last Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, June 12, 13 and 14. The session opened at 2 p.m., when the moderator, the Rev. W. W. Wylie, pastor of the church, took the chair. Addresses were delivered by the Rev. M. Neilson of Paisley, Mr. W. E. Senior of Toronto, also Rev. J. G. Brown, D. D., and Rev. T. T. Shields, D.D., of Toronto. A splendid representation from the different churches was in evidence right from the start. Dr. Shields and Dr. Brown gave very stirring messages. Dr. Brown dealing with the missionary enterprise among the Telugus. Dr. Shields held a conference in the afternoon on Home Mission work, and in the evening gave an excellent exposition on "The Elder Brother" as told in the story of the prodigal son. The Rev. V. L. Shantz of Chesley also favored the congregation with an address. Not the least of these addresses was the address of welcome given to the delegates by Mayor Laidlaw, and we heard one of the pastors say that "the mayor has given us the privilege of visiting every public institution in town, but the Saugeen—perhaps he is afraid he might go fishing". Rev. McIntosh responded to the mayor, and Rev. Leopoldt responded to the greetings from the Rev. Mr. Whaley and Rev. Mr. Moyer. Wednesday, the ladies had first place, the men going to the Methodist church for their conference, which had been kindly lent to them, and which they appreciated very much.

Addresses were given at the ladies' meeting by the following ladies: Mrs. (Rev.) Wylie, of Durham, on "Our Task Conducted," which was very much appreciated; also Mrs. McIntosh, of Owen Sound, on "Systematic Giving", a very timely message. Mrs. C. Brown of Durham gave the address of welcome, and all were delighted with it, nothing lacking as regards courtesy and goodwill in her address. Mrs. Pickard of Warton replied in her own happy way. Addresses were also given by Mrs. Thompson of Owen Sound, Mrs. (Rev.) McEwen of Warton, and Miss Selman, returned missionary. Special music was rendered very sweetly by Rev. and Mrs. Shantz of Chesley, and also by Miss Lottie Day, of Owen Sound.

The Wednesday night service suffered in numbers through the storm, but the program was a splendid one. Rev. C. C. Anderson of Meaford giving an address on "Christ and Our Helplessness," also Rev. W. Daniel, B.A., of Toronto, giving an address on the work in the west. The Rev. Judson McIntosh of Owen Sound, preached the annual sermon, which was dealt with at length in our last issue.

Thursday was a great day for great speeches, and what a lot of Durhamites were conspicuous by their absence, and what a lot they missed. "Christ and Our Hunger" by Rev. J. Leopoldt, of Hanover; "The Sermon that the World Needs" by Rev. E. J. McEwen, of Warton; "Emphasizing Our Distinctive Principles" by Rev. W. S. Buckberrough, of Port Elgin; "Christ and Our Deadness" by Bro. Buckberrough; "Christ and Our Fruitlessness" by Rev. Bilton, Strathavon, Professor P. S. Campbell of McMaster University, on "The Value of Education" and "Essentials for a Revival"; Rev. W. W. Wylie on the problems of the day—"Problems of Pain," "Fallen Heroes," "Church Life," "Education," "Of Wealth in its Relation to Poverty," "Political Problems," "Conscription," etc.; problems to be met with "The Word of God," "The Spirit-filled Life" and "Our Work Directed by the Spirit." The Rev. P. K. Dayfoot, M. A., of Toronto, also spoke on behalf of the Young People's work, and held a conference on Sabbath school work.

The whole sessions were filled with inspiration and blessing. Every delegate went away feeling that this gathering had been one of the very best in every way, and much appreciation was expressed for the splendid hospitality and kindness that was shown to them on every hand by the people of Durham and their Baptist friends.

THE NEW VOTERS' LIST

Changes to be made in the preparation of the voters' lists so as to include the women of the province, who have been given the franchise privilege, have been issued in memorandum for the clerks of the local municipalities. The new act has been officially proclaimed. The effect of the changes in the lists means that in the townships, villages and towns, other than county or district towns having a population of 9,000 or over, the voters' lists will be prepared in two parts instead of three. The third part formerly contained the names of persons qualified to vote at elections to the legislative assembly only, and this will be left out. Part one will contain the names of every resident 21 years of age and a British subject who is assessed as either a tenant or owner of property or for incomes of \$400, or a farmer's son. Part two will contain the names of all men and women qualified to vote at municipal elections only, and will include all non-residents assessed as owners, tenants, or income. In cities and county or district towns having a population of 9,000 or over, only one list will be prepared, which will include every person, resident or non-resident, 21 years of age, a British subject, who is assessed as owner or tenant of property to the required amount, or for income of \$400 or over. After the name of every woman on the list, the clerk should designate whether she is married, widow or spinster. A woman has the same right to appeal as a man.

The clerk when making up the voters' list must not enter the names of any person marked by the assessor upon the assessment roll as being an alien. It is understood in Ottawa that the Government has under preparation a measure to extend the franchise to the women of Canada, from coast to coast, and that it will be introduced shortly in the commons.

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wide powers of control over coal distribution, for the railways have too long held arbitrary powers over it. Transportation facilities next winter are likely to be worse, rather than better, especially as the congestion of traffic in the United States is likely to react seriously upon our carrying systems. Our railways are notoriously short of freight cars, of motive power, and other equipment, for giving the best service in moving coal even on short hauls.

Coal delivery in Toronto, or any point within reasonable distance of the Niagara frontier, ought not to cost more than three dollars over the pit-mouth price. Sharp restriction of the profits of Canadian coal dealers is demanded in the public interest.

RESTRICTING COAL PRICES

The price of anthracite coal in the United States is being regulated by the Federal Trade Commission. Though without power to fix legal maximum prices, the Commission has adopted the system of requiring all producers to file complete reports of all sales and contracts, with prices. The schedule of maximum prices "suggested" is \$4.90 for egg coal, \$5.15 for stove coal, \$5.25 for chestnut, and \$5.45 for pea coal. The outlook is for observance of the rules and price limits set by the Commission.

If the restriction works out successfully, both the United States and Canadian consumers will be protected against wild panics such as prevailed last February and March, when anthracite coal in some localities went to \$12 a ton. The investigations of the Commission showed that in that period operators got from \$4 to \$6 a ton over circular prices, in many instances, and jobbers got profits of from \$1 to \$6 instead of the usual 25 cents. If prices at the mine mouth are held down to reasonable levels, the control of distribution costs is facilitated. The appointment of Mr. C. A. Magrath as Fuel Controller for the Dominion is designed to regulate supplies, distribution and costs in this country. Mr. Magrath has the task of getting our transportation facilities so mobilized that before next winter comes we should have a reserve store of coal. There is need of a public authority with
