A curious, not to say pathetic spectacle was presented in London, England, recently, when a well-known play was enacted before a large audience by actors, who wore their street clothes instead of costumes and played on a stage utterly bare of scenery. The only properties used, aside from one or two pieces of furniture, were a teacup and a telephone bell. The explanation of this strange performance lies in the fact that the audience, with a few exceptions, was composed of soldiers who had lost their sight. That the afflicted men were able to follow the action closely was indicated by their quick response to tragic and humorous lines. The action in one scene called for the breaking of a teacup, and in another the ringing of a telephone bell, hence the presence of these articles on the stage.

### TURKS TREAT GREEKS WORSE THAN BELGIANS

A recent despatch from Athens says:—Greeks under Turkish rule in Asia Minor are receiving brutal treatment at the hands of Germans and Bashi-Bazouks.

Large numbers of Greeks have been deported from the flourishing towns of Aivali, where the cruelty displayed by the soldiery is said to have exceeded that shown in Belgium. With regard to many Greek women, all their relatives and friends can hope is that they are dead. Liberals blame the royalist government, which on two occasions has declined to participate in action against Turkey for the liberation of the Greeks under Turkish rule.

### CATTLE BRING GOOD PRICES AT ELORA SALE

The most successful sale of Short-horns in Canada for a quarter of a century was held last week at Elora when Messrs. Watt & Gardhouse sold 63 head, exclusive of calves at foot, for \$49,150. Thirty-nine head were taken by American buyers at an average of \$837, and 24 head by Canadian purchasers at an average of \$686. The top price, \$2,600, was paid by J. E. Crosbie, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, for the bull, Marquis of Lancaster, two years old in August. Mr. Crosbie also paid the second highest price of the sale, \$2,025, for Britannia, two years old in October. Mr. Crosbie bought six head all told.

### GREAT LAKES STEAMER SUNK BY SUB.

A despatch from Halifax, under date of July 5th, says:

A man who fought an exciting duel with a U-boat arrived here today on his way home to Sydney. This was Captain Luke Holmes, whose steamer was torpedoed without warning. He is as game as ever for war zone voyages. The Scottish Hero, his steamer, sailed from Sydney on May 31st, with a cargo of steel products for Havre and Manchester. She carried a crew of 31 men, and sailed under the command of Captain Holmes, who took charge of her when she was purchased by the Black Diamond Line last year. This is Captain Holmes' second experience with U-boats. He was on the steamer Morwenna, also of the Black Diamond Line, when in 1915 she was torpedoed when on her way out from England in ballast. The Scottish Hero was well known on the Great Lakes.

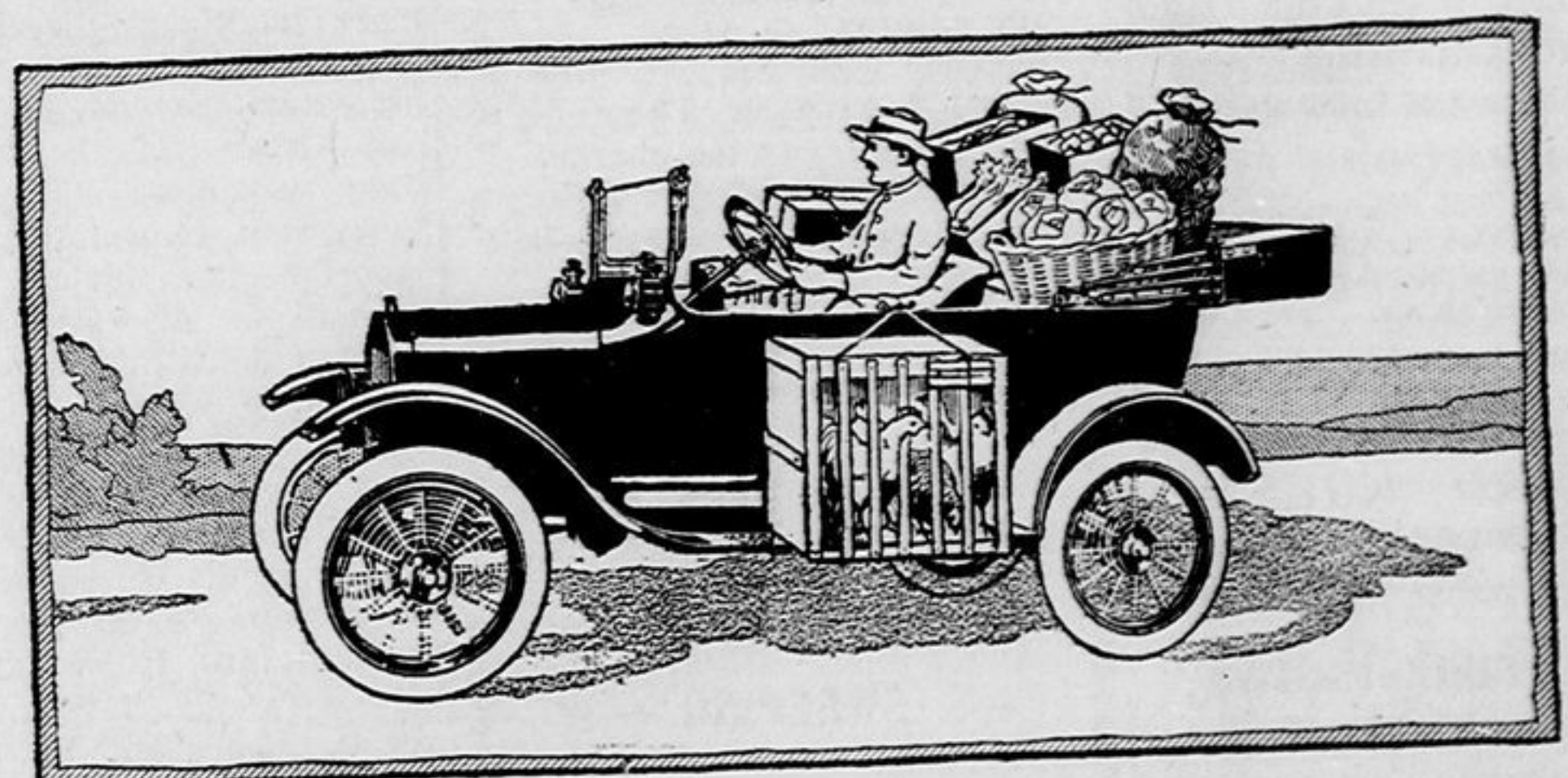
