SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject, or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by

price may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3 per acre. Duties—Residence six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as resident duties, under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

REPORT OF LOCAL RED CROSS July 1916 to July 1917

The Durham branch of the Red Cross has just concluded another successful year's work. During that time, they met at first once a week, and as the demand for supplies increased, they met twice a week.

During the summer months, ice cream and cake were sold every Saturday. A number of the ladies gave teas, and a lawn social was held at Dr. Jamieson's. On Show day, the ladies served meals and some of the young people sold flags and roses. Mr. A. Bell and his willing workers have done a great deal for the Red Cross. Meetings were held in the surrounding sections, and in almost all cases local branches were formed, besides the money raised. A tea and dance were given by the Laidlaw family and some of the young people gave several dances in the hall. The Boy Scouts gave a concert, when half the proceeds came to the Red Cross.

Socks were sent to the French Sock Fund, and also to the 147th Greys. Christmas boxes, valued at \$1 each were sent to all the boys who had enlisted from Durham and vicinity. The money for these boxes was partly raised by donations, and the rest taken from the funds of the society.

In February, a very successful carnival was held in the rink, and the lady minstrels gave an entertainment in the hall, when half the proceeds came to the society.

The young ladies' Dramatic Club of Hanover, came over and gave one of their high-class concerts, when the total proceeds were given to Red Cross. Dr. Jamieson gave a very generous donation to the society. During the year, the following articles were sent to Headquarters:

1610 pairs socks, 2252 pillow slips, 829 shirts, 1348 towels, 97 pillows, 800 suits pyjamas, 679 ordinary bandages, 9 tail bandages, 353 face cloths, 2 quilts, 1 pair wristlets, 1 scarf; 7381 articles.
