Lieut. Yule Remembers Durham

8th Reserve Battalion, C.E.F.

Shorncliffe, Kent, England. Dear Mr. Irwin,-As so much space was taken up in your paper each week during the winter and spring in telling of the doings of the 248th Battalion, C.E.F., I imagine that you, as well as the other good people of Durham and vicinity have been wondering what has happened to it. Well, it is no more, and the men who belonged to it now form No. 7 Company of the 8th Reserve Battalion, with Major Corry in command, and Capt. Douglas second in command. Of the Durham boys, only Mulcock, Giles and Boyce are here. The remainder are still at Otterpool, where they are in quarantine with measles. I was sorry that they were unable to have McConnell, J.H. (killed in action) their leave at the same time as the other boys.

We felt quite at home when we came here, as there are so many officers and men from Grey County here. The 147th men who are still here are either instructors or are unfit for service in France. Lieut .-Colonel McFarland goes to France shortly, while Lieut. Col. Gordon, a returned officer, succeeds him. Major Fleming is still second in command, and is working as hard as ever to keep up the enviable reputation which the 8th Reserve has made for itself in England.

While we were in Otterpool, airraid alarms were all the fashion. We had four in three days although Fritz didn't honor our camp with a visit. During the first alarm, we felt sure that Fritz had heard of the arrival of the 248th Battalion, and had come over especially to get us. However, during our stay there we got used to it, and were second to none in making for shelter when the alarm was sounded.

As soon as we came here, we were given our six days' leave, and have yet to meet a man who said he didn't enjoy it. 
