FARMERS AND CHEMISTRY Experiments in Canada with Fertilizers Should Benefit Production

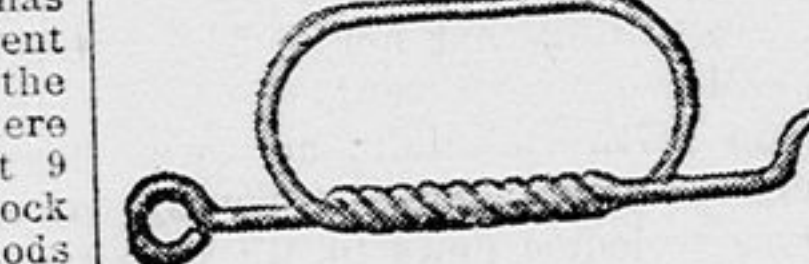

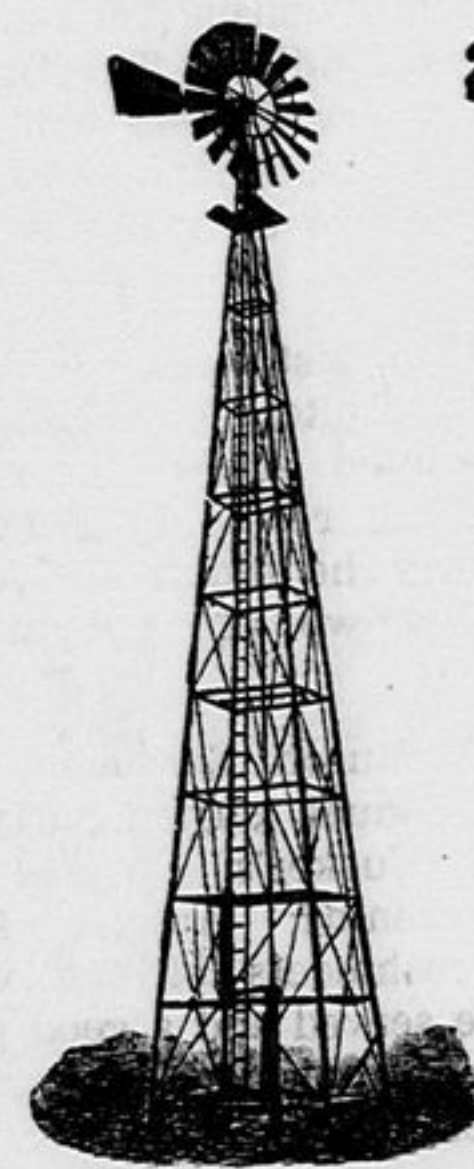
