Miss Saunders, who spends the winter in Toronto, is a daughter of Rev. E. M. Saunders, Doctor of Divinity, late of Halifax.

The home of the Saunders in Halifax was the sanctuary as well of fur and feathers. The premises boasted a goats' kennel, guinea pigs' houses, dogs' accommodation, kittens' quarters, and an aviary inhabited by some two hundred birds.

Miss Saunders, who ran this one herself, is a great exponent of reservations for birds which should exist at the public charges.

It distresses Miss Saunders to see birds and other creatures suffer needless pain. She has fought the traffic in captive wild birds, native and imported, and happy to tell, has made important headway.

This practical love of the lower creation on the part of Marshall Saunders extends, not only to her feathered friends but also to all the wild and the dependent on man.

Miss Saunders was trained for a teacher and did teach for a short while in her girlhood in Nova Scotia.

GALWAY TO HALIFAX

A SCHEME TO CONNECT DOMINION WITH MOTHERLAND.

It is Proposed That the Splendid Irish Harbor Should Be Used as Part of an Undertaking Which Will Strengthen the Empire and Also Please People of Ireland.

At a dinner given, some time ago, by the Empire Press Union, in London, in honor of the delegates of the Imperial War Conference, a point brought out by several of the speakers was the great need of the Empire of improving its means of communication.

In these circumstances, the question of an All-Red route from London to Canada, by way of the port of Galway, on the west coast of Ireland, discussed in the interview with the famous railway builder, Mr. Robert Worthington, of Dublin, becomes a specially important one.

The scheme has, as might be expected, influential support, support which comes from Galway itself, from twenty-seven municipal, county, and district councils in Ireland, from the Dublin Chamber of Commerce, the Port and Docks Board of the Dublin Corporation, and other public bodies.

The contract for mail service between Canada, the West Indies, and South America, subsidy authorized \$340,666.66, is held by the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, which earned the full amount in 1916.

Buying Our Blankets. Orders for blankets aggregating one million dollars have been placed among Canadian manufacturers by the United States Government for army purposes, according to the head of one of the largest industrial corporations in Canada.

Reaches Height of 380 Feet. Douglas fir is the largest structural timber growing in Canada. Trees have been measured up to 380 feet high, with a maximum diameter of fifteen feet.

Decorations for American Legion. Members of the American Legion in the Canadian army who have won decorations for bravery in the field in the present war hereafter will receive also, as gifts from their regimental commanders, a silver decoration bearing the crest of George Washington upon the Canadian maple leaf.

SUBSIDIES TO SHIPPING.

What the Dominion Gives to Promote Trade and Commerce.

The total amount of mail subsidies and steamship subventions to Canadian shipping asked for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1918, is \$2,630,734, according to the report of the Department of Trade and Commerce.

Among the requirements that are common to all contracts under which these subsidies are awarded to shipping companies is the stipulation that two-thirds of the total number of officers, engineers, and all other employees on steamships engaged in the service shall be British subjects.

The contracts for the various services are distributed as follows: From Canadian Atlantic ports to Australia and New Zealand, for which the subsidy asked is \$140,000, the service is in the hands of the New Zealand Shipping Company, Ltd.

Between Canada and South Africa the contract for monthly mail steamers is in the hands of Elder Dempster Shipping Company, Ltd. Since the beginning of the war the full amount of subsidy has not been earned, \$121,600 being paid last year.

Turnbull-Pearl—That Wm. Falkingham, who enlisted early in the war, but who has not been recognized by any municipality, and who claims to belong to Glenelg, be paid \$8, the same as other recruits, and that his name be placed on the honor roll for Glenelg; also John R. McDonald, who is reported killed; and that anyone legally entitled to the same be paid \$8, the same as was paid to other recruits.

McInnis-Pearl—That the O'Neil brothers be paid \$20 for shingling and general repairs to stable and shed, and that Herb. Harrison be paid for shingles for 18 squares, \$54, and \$1.40 for 70 feet of ridge board.

McInnis-Black—That John Nichol be paid \$18, T. McKeown \$36, and Mrs. A. Murchison \$23 for sheep killed by dogs, and that Angus McArthur be paid \$4 for sheep valuation.

Pearl-Black—That the treasurer of Markdale be paid \$18 for three years rent of hall for division court purposes.

Pearl-Black—That the treasurer accept two dollars from P. Fogarty for shingles left from roofing the shed and stables.

Turnbull-McInnis—That gravel accounts be paid as follows: J. McCarthy \$4.70, J. Delaney 75, S. F. Morlock \$1.50, J. McGillivray, including damage to crop, \$5.25, Dr. Smith \$1.10, J. Ledingham \$1.55, T. McComb \$3.80, Walter Ewing, including road to pit, \$3.55, D. McLachlin \$4.45, R.E. Inglis \$1.80, W. Jacques \$5.60, J. Robson \$2.70, T. Laughlin \$2.70, J. 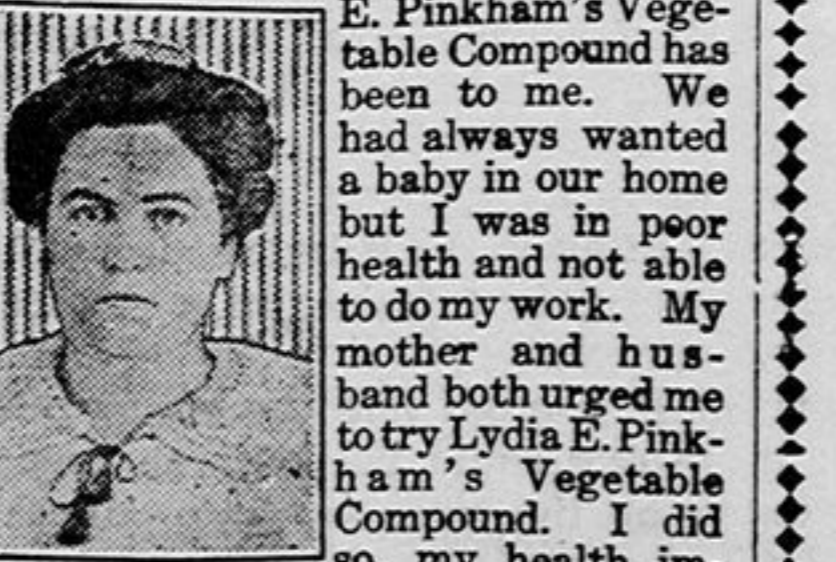
