TENDERS FOR PULPWOOD LIMIT

Tenders will be received by the undersigned up to and including the seventeenth day of December next for the right to cut pulpwood and pine timber on a certain area situate in the vicinity of the Kapuskasing River in the Districts of Timiscaming and Algoma.

Tenders are to offer a flat rate per cord for all classes of pulpwood, whether spruce or other woods. The successful tenderer shall be required to pay for the Red and White Pine on the limit a flat rate of \$10 per thousand feet board measure.

The successful tenderer shall also be required to erect a mill or mills on or near the territory, and to manufacture the wood into pulp and paper in the Province of Ontario, in accordance with the terms and conditions of sale which can be had on application to the Department.

Parties making tender will be required to deposit with their tender a marked cheque payable to the Honourable the Treasurer of the Province of Ontario, for Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00), which amount will be forfeited in the event of their not entering into agreement to carry out conditions, etc. The said Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) will be held by the Department until such time as the terms and conditions of the agreement to be entered into have been compiled with and the said mills erected, equipped and in operation. The said sum may then be applied in such amounts and at such times as the Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines may direct in payment of accounts for dues or of any other obligation due the Crown until the whole sum has been applied.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

The Council met November 17th as per adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: T. J. Hannigan on good roads, W. W. Dunlop claim for patient in Woodstock hospital, R. McDowal re Weir ditch, several claims for sheep killed by dogs, Wm. Brown petition for bonus for wire fence, Albert H. Abbott, on organization of resources, Thos. Harrison account for lumber. A deputation consisting of A. McVicar and Mr. Watson appeared before the Council soliciting aid for Priceville Agricultural Society.

Peart—Black—That the deputation from Priceville Agricultural Society be granted \$15.00, provided that each of the other three townships contribute equal amounts.—Carried.

\$176.00 was paid for sheep claims as follows: Pat Malone \$115.00, R. E. English \$32.00, Wm. Firth \$15.00 and Albert Smith \$14.00. Payment on road repairs were made as follows: Thos. Turnbull balance of appropriation Ward 1, \$109.55; M. McInnis special works in Ward 2, \$25.00; Malcolm Black repairs to bridge at lot 43, con. 3, N. D. R., \$161.00; M. Black balance of appropriation in Ward 4, \$87.50. On motion of Messrs. Peart and Turnbull, other payments were made as follows: Thomas Harrison, lumber and stringers for bridge, \$42.00; Robert Lindsay, two men and team one day, \$6.00; Robert Lindsay, 3 stringers for bridge Lambton St., \$9.00; Duncan McNab, 1/4 day work on Lambton St., \$1.50; A. McQuaig, one day on Lambton St., \$2; Jerry Allord, work on the Weir ditch, \$6.00.

Turnbull—McInnis—That Robert Whitmore be paid \$8.00, being the usual donation paid to recruits.—Carried.

Peart—McInnis—That the Grey and Bruce Insurance Company be paid \$1.74 on policy and the Bell Telephone Company 20 cents for service.—Carried.

Peart—Turnbull—That this council grant the British Red Cross \$250 and the Y.M.C.A. an equal sum of \$250.—Carried.

Turnbull—Peart—That Jas. Ellison be paid \$3.85 for gravel, as certified to by Pathmaster Melosh.—Carried.

Peart—McInnis—That Wm. Brown be paid \$20.00 for building 80 rods of wire fence along sideline 20, and that Henry Eckhardt be paid \$15.25 for 61 rods of wire fence along lots 28, 29, con. 2, S. D. R.—Carried.

Turnbull—Peart—That the clerk be paid \$10.00 on salary.—Carried.

Turnbull—Peart—That commissions on expenditure be paid as follows: Thos. Turnbull, Ward 1, \$18.50; M. McInnis, Ward 2, \$2.50; M. Black, Ward 4, \$8.56.

MURDER AT SEA

The unwritten law of the deep from time immemorial has been that the captain of a ship must defend with his life the passengers entrusted to his safe-keeping, and be himself the last to leave the ship.

By the laws of civilized nations the lives of those travelling on unprotected ships have been considered sacred.

It has been left to modern German Culture to introduce Murder at Sea. We remember the Lusitania, Falaba, the Belgium Prince, but at this moment we particularly think of Capt. Fryatt, in command of a passenger ship, whose only offence was that he sought to save the ship from the hungry maw of the Prussian Wolf in endeavoring to save his ship from being submerged. He was sent through the farce of a mock trial, condemned to death and was shot.

Had he been a naval officer, seaman or soldier, he would have been made prisoner; because he was a merchant seaman, his life (according to the law of German civilization) must be forfeited. He is only one of many; thousands have been torpedoed again and
