SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject, or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may apply for a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Department Lands Agency or Sub-District Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3 per acre. Duties—Residence six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent is secured. A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, shall have one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

TENDERS FOR PULPWOOD LIMIT

Tenders will be received by the undersigned up to and including the seventeenth day of December next for the right to cut pulpwood and pine timber on a certain area situate in the vicinity of the Kapuskasing River in the Districts of Timiscaming and Algoma.

Tenderers are to offer a flat rate per cord for all classes of pulpwood, whether spruce or other woods. The successful tenderer shall be required to pay for the Red and White Pine on the limit a flat rate of \$10 per thousand feet board measure.

The successful tenderer shall also be required to erect a mill or mills on or near the territory, and to manufacture the wood into pulp and paper in the Province of Ontario, in accordance with the terms and conditions of sale which can be had on application to the Department.

Parties making tender will be required to deposit with their tender a marked cheque payable to the Honourable the Treasurer of the Province of Ontario, for Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00), which amount will be forfeited in the event of their not entering into agreement to carry out conditions, etc. The said Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) will be held by the Department until such time as the terms and conditions of the agreement to be entered into have been complied with and the said mills erected, equipped and in operation.

The said sum may then be applied in such amounts and at such times as the Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines may direct in payment of accounts for dues or of any other obligation due the Crown until the whole sum has been applied.

HARRY LAUDER MAKES GREAT AUDIENCE WEEP

Harry Lauder, appearing in serious role at the Hippodrome, New York, before a vast audience of men and a few scattering women, moved his hearers as his wonderful comedy songs have never done. He appealed to America, as "Britain's big brother" to give, generously, freely, gladly, withholding nothing to crush Prussianism.

"A previous speaker," said Mr. Lauder, "stated that I would speak to you for the soldiers of Scotland. Friends, let me tell you that little Scotland needs no one to speak for her." A mighty roar of applause greeted this tribute.

"Prussianism must be crushed. We must do our duty now, to-day, without delay, or we shall fall. I could give you hundreds of reasons why Prussianism must be crushed utterly, as I have been through the trenches, where I learned much. I will content myself with two instances, and what I tell you I know to be true.

"My boy, (the son who later was killed in action, although Mr. Lauder did not refer to that) came home inviolated. I asked him: 'What kind of a man is the enemy, son?' And this is what he told me:

Murder Sixty Scots. "Sixty of our soldiers were captured. They were of the Forty-second Highlanders."

The mention of these wonderful fighters fired the audience to an enthusiastic demonstration. When finally it subsided, Mr. Lauder continued:

"The Germans made those sixty brave men strip stark naked and stand at attention all night in the rain. In the morning, an officer came to them and told them they were to return to their own trench across No Man's Land. They started, and when half way across German machine guns opened fire and killed every last one of them."

"I know that is true," declared Mr. Lauder, "because my boy would not tell me a lie."

Men and women alike wept frankly.

One of our men I found in a hospital," the speaker continued. "His face was half gone. I asked him how it happened. He told me he had gone over the top with some comrades, captured a German trench and that he had picked up a fountain pen in one of the German dug-outs. A few hours later he sat down to write a letter home. When he unscrewed the cap of the pen, it exploded, tearing away his face."

"These are samples of the things we, every one of us, must have a part in crushing utterly from the face of the earth. If it were possible to buy liberty, I should say buy it by all means. But liberty cannot be bought. We must give men and we must give our money to care for them."

The meeting was held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A.

SAILORS SEEKING AID FOR THEIR FAMILIES

Vital and urgent are the needs of the Navy League, which is caring for the work of looking after the needs of torpedoed seamen of the Mercantile Marine and Naval service. Canada has surprised the world in the generosity of her people for patriotic purposes, but the golden showers have practically all fallen on the Army, while the men of the seas have received little attention.

Last year many Canadian municipalities made grants for Navy League objects, and the proceeds were sent to the Motherland. This year, a Sailors' Day will be held on December 8th, which is the anniversary of the Falkland Islands Victory, and His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, who is Vice-President of the Navy League of Great Britain, has issued a statement, in which he lauds the excellent work of the League, and expresses the hope that Canadians will give to the cause. As a class, the men of the Merchant Marine and Naval service are very poorly paid, and in many cases their families are suffering great privations, and there is a distressing lack of funds to send them proper assistance.

However, it is hoped that the S. O. S. call on December 8th will receive a very generous response, and that the men guarding the high seas and carrying our commerce to all parts of the world, will be made to feel that the people at home have not forgotten them. Their families must be looked after.

Indians are Liable for Service.

Indians, though liable for service under the Military Service Act, are to have until Feb. 1st to report for service or to claim exemption. This ruling, which was issued Friday from Ottawa, was made with the idea of clearing up any misunderstanding that may have existed up to the present time with regard to the status of Indians under the draft law. This will give the Indian citizens who through ignorance of the provisions of the act, or for other reasons, have failed to comply with the Military Service Act by going to the Post Office and reporting for service, or claiming exemption, before November 10, an opportunity to comply with the provisions of the act, without suffering any penalties which might have been imposed upon them through their neglecting to do so. Such men as have failed to comply do so through the deputy registrar or through any of the Indian agents in their district. It is apparently not the intention of the authorities that they should go to the post office, as the postal authorities have nothing further to do with the reports or claims for exemption.
