

**NOW THEY'RE SEEING THINGS IN LONDON, ONTARIO**

A dispatch from London, Ont. to the St. Thomas Times-Journal says: The manipulation of psychic force is undoubtedly responsible for the appearance of the outline of the human head which adorns the basement wall of London's city hall, according to a statement by Francis L. Watts, F.R.C., R.C.P., who is investigating the phenomena. The outline or shadow which has persisted for years, in spite of coats of paint and whitewash, has puzzled officials and public alike, but the scientific explanation is conclusive, according to Dr. Watts, who is a psycho-analyst of some note and must be accepted. The shadow on the city hall basement wall, it has been established, has a direct connection with the murder of a London man on King street in 1874. Dr. Watts has spent some time in his researches, and declares that the inquest in that particular case was held in the very room in which the shadow now appears. The body of the victim was propped up against the wall, while the jury deliberated. The outline, however, is not that of the victim, but of the murderer, who escaped and went to the United States, while a woman accomplice paid the penalty. Records show that the murderer confessed on his deathbed years afterwards and it is the opinion of the local scientist that the travail of his mental condition at that time was the force which resulted in the impress of his own image on the wall at the spot where his victim's body was laid. A spiritualist, in a seance of which there is a good record, afterwards gave additional evidence regarding the murder and the shadow on the wall. Robinson Hall, where the inquest was held in 1874, was on the actual site, if not actually a part of the building, which was later purchased by the city and converted into municipal offices.
