But the cleaning of the outside of the platter is not the only requisite. We may plant trees, paint our houses, trim our lawns and do many other things to beautify the exterior, but in the absence of removing a pile of inflammable litter from the back yard, and a pile of decayed vegetables from the cellar, we have a danger from the former to the destruction of our property from fire, and in the latter lurks a menace to the good health of the household. These must be attended to as matters of economy and general well-being. Any movement that makes for reduction from fire losses is a move in the direction of economy, hence the advisability of clearing away all inflammable material

from the homes, both inside and out. That unsanitary cess-pool in the back yard is a breeding place for flies and other carriers of disease. Remove the breeding place and reduce the danger, should be regarded as a sane piece of advice. Disease will bring death and doctor bills. By removing the cause we remove the cost. An old building filled with inflammable litter is a veritable firetrap, and while the removal of the building may not be deemed a matter of expedience the removal of the litter will reduce the danger.

### CLEAN UP NOW

It may become monotonous, but we are still determined to keep citizens reminded of the importance of home improvements. Tree planting in particular needs immediate attention and should be done in season. Neglect this season means a year's loss of growth. In some of the other suggested improvements a delay of a few weeks will not matter so much but to get enjoyment out of your labor, and the greatest possible amount of enjoyment, no time should be lost in getting to work. Plant trees, clean up back yards, trim up lawns and remove all breeding places of filth and disease, and DO IT NOW. Let each one do a little and W. S. Willis, W. Willis, N. 
