the Easter holidays with friends in Toronto.

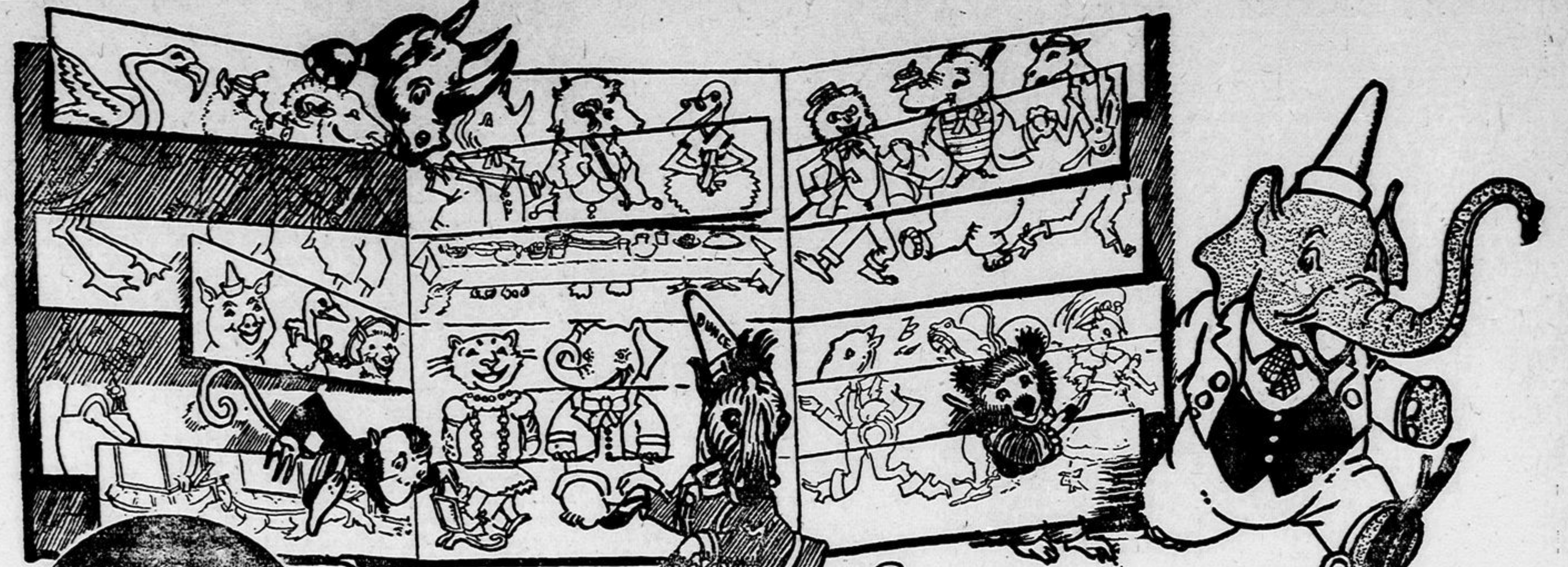
Mrs. Angus Kennedy is visiting her daughter in Toronto this week.
