**ANOTHER SANCTUARY NAMED**

A dispatch from Toronto on Saturday tells of the designating of a game sanctuary in Caledon township Peel County, by the Provincial authorities. This is the fifth to be designated in Ontario, Grey County having two, one at Eugenia and the other at Peacemarch, near Thornbury. There is also one in Essex and one near Ottawa.

The Peel reserve has been designated at the request of residents in

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that territory. The hunting, taking or killing of any game bird or animal in or upon such preserve is now prohibited. It is not intended at the present time to stock the sanctuary with further game.

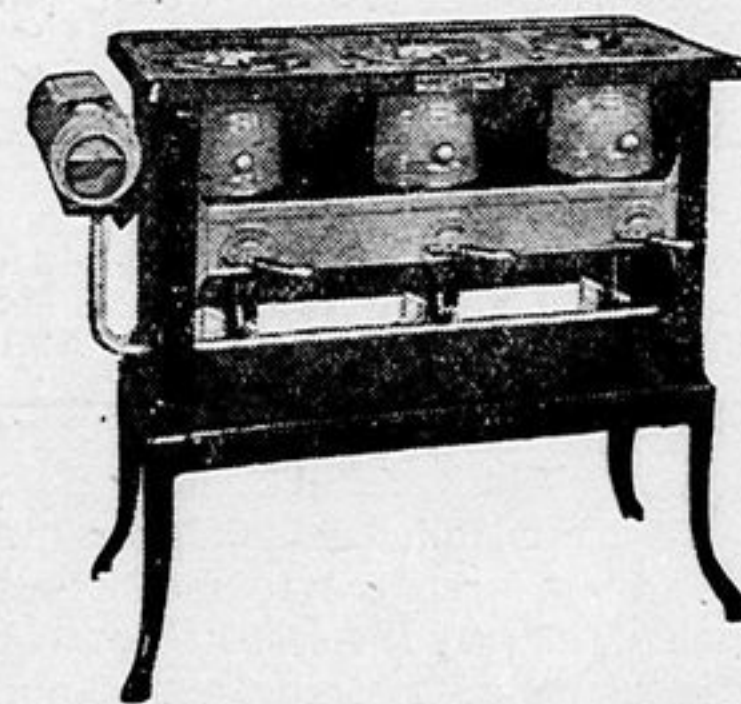
