MARKDALE'S OLDEST CITIZEN

In 1843 he married Miss Ann Bragg and came to Canada in 1848. For two years they resided in Darlington and then came to Artemesia in 1850. Mrs. Stidwill died in 1904, two years after they had moved to Markdale. Mr. Stidwill, now 102 years of age, is still hale and hearty, and enjoys life as well as he ever did. He never used tobacco, nor was he addicted to strong drink.

ORANGEVILLE MAN MISSING; SEARCH PARTIES OUT

Search parties started out from Orangeville last Friday morning to look for James May, a resident of that place, aged about 36 years, who left his home the previous Monday morning and has not been heard of since. May, who has been in ill-health for some time, due to nerve trouble, is an employee of the C.P.R. One brother, John, is serving a term in Brampton jail for holding up a hotelkeeper in that town about two years ago. Another brother committed suicide near Fraxa Junction a few years ago. John May, the father of the missing man, is 101 years old, and a respected resident of Orangeville. James May is married and has a wife and family of small children. The body of May was subsequently found hanging to a tree near the Orangeville cemetery, an evident case of suicide.
