**Giving In to the Bolsheviki.**  
(Buffalo Express.)

France and Belgium are right. Restoration of the confiscated property of foreigners in Russia should be insisted upon as a first essential to any recognition of the Bolsheviki. The invitation to the Genoa conference laying down the terms on which the Bolsheviki would be received stated that they must agree "to recognize all public debts and obligation to restore or, in case of default, to indemnify all foreign interests for loss or damage which has been caused by the confiscation or sequestration of property." Furthermore, they were "to establish legal and juristic punishment and insure the impartial execution of all commercial or other contracts."

The Bolsheviki by accepting the invitation bound themselves to do these things. They have not kept faith on a single point. They have clearly indicated that they never had any intention of keeping faith. By what reasoning process has the British premier brought himself to the point of being willing to excuse them from fulfilling the conditions which were laid down for them? The Genoa conference could be a success from the viewpoint of Great Britain and other Western powers only in so far as it might reach an agreement with the Bolsheviki based upon the terms stipulated in the invitation. An agreement which allows them to ignore the terms of the invitation, flout the British Government and dictate their own terms for recognition would not mean a successful conference for those who called it. It would mean a success for the Bolsheviki alone. Surely the viewpoint of the British must have become very much awry if they are willing to contribute to that kind of success.

**British Pay Big Taxes.**

It is something for the world to marvel over when it sees that in the last year the United Kingdom was still paying income and super taxes of nearly two billions of dollars a year, and the great bulk of it contributed by England, with a population of only 38,000,000. The country was raising a total annual revenue of five and a half billions of dollars and saving a sufficient surplus out of that revenue to reduce its net dead weight debt in the twelve months by more than \$200,000,000. The natural question that will leap from many a lip is where do the British people get it to pay? The government gets it from all the people who have an income of as much as one thousand dollars a year. The tax applies in the same ratio alike to those coming under the super tax clause.

**Put Idle Lots to Work.**

There has been so much unemployment during the past winter, as well as short time work, that it is to be hoped the value of the unworked back garden or idle lot will not be overlooked as a method of adding to the family income.

The war demonstrated what could be accomplished in this respect, and the lesson taught should not be lost.
