EGREMONT COUNCIL
Council met May 29, members all present, minutes adopted.

Comr. Wilson reported expenditure to the amount of \$18.25 for road improvement in this division.

Comr. McDougald reported expenditure to the amount of \$37.63 in his division; fees \$4.50.

Comr. Groat reported expenditure to the amount of \$59.17; fees \$4.00.

Comr. Allan reported expenditure to the amount of \$71.05 in his division; fees \$5.00.

The Council formed into a Court of Revision on Assessment Roll 1922 with the Reeve in the chair. Members subscribed to the required declaration. There were two appeals presented against assessments, viz., John T. Brown, owner of G. A., Con. 19, and Lot 1, Con. 20. Complaint, assessed too high. Peter Daly, owner of Lot 7, Con. 20, complaint, assessed too high. No reduction in the assessment of either appeals was made.

Property changes.—Thos. Boakes, owner, Lot pt. 9, Con. 18; Janet McMeeken, owner, Lot E. 8, Con. 3; Ann Jane Lamont, owner, Lot 9, Con. 9; David Eccles, owner, Lot 6, Con. 16; Martha Reid and Peter Reid, owners, Lot S. pt. 8, Con. 16; Robert Keating, struck off as tenant, Lot 5, Con. 5.

The Court then adjourned to meet again in the afternoon of next session of Council.

Council resumed, By-laws were passed appointing Sheep Valuers in divisions Nos. 4 and 5; authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow money from the Bank of Montreal providing for expenditure on township roads under the provision of the Ontario Highways Act.

Wilson—McDougald—In reference to the account from the Royal Alexandra Hospital at Fergus, re E. Silts, that an order be drawn on the Treasurer to the amount of \$22.50.—Car.

Groat—Allan—In reference to the communication from the Clerk of Proton Township advising that a grant of \$75.00 had been made by Proton Council to be expended on Egremont and Proton town line between Con. 7 and 8, Proton, providing Egremont Council supplement same, that this Council supplement the grant made by Proton Council, providing Egremont's grant is expended between Cons. 9 and 10 Egremont.—Carried.

A deputation consisting of a number of the ratepayers from the north part of the township waited on the Council stating the advantage of the road known as the Cement Road to the ratepayers of that part of the Township, and requesting the Council to consider the matter of making a grant toward the purchase of this road.

Wilson—McDougald—That Deputy Reeve Allan interview the parties concerned in the matter of this road and report at next meeting of the Council.—Carried.

A delegation representing the Women's Institute waited on the Council requesting certain improvements to be made to the monumental plot.

McEachern—Wilson—That Councillor Groat, D. Allan and J. R. Philp be a committee to attend to the matter of having the necessary improvements made to the monumental plot.—Carried.

McDougald—Allan—That subject to the approval of the plans and specifications by the Government and also subject to the conditions under which the cattle pass was constructed at Lot 17, Con. 6, that the following contracts be let to Alex. Hill, Mt. Forest, viz., placing abutments under the bridge known as Porter's 10th sideroad; the construction of a new bridge on Con. 14; the construction of a cattle pass at Lot 17, Con. 6, and the repairing of the abutment of the Drury bridge, contracts to be drawn up and signed by the Reeve and Mr. Hill.—Carried.

The requisition of the Police Village Trustees was received by the Council, requesting that the sum of \$200.00 be levied on the rateable property of the Police Village to meet current expenses for the year 1922.

Wilson—McDougald—That the following accounts be paid: Municipal World, supplies, \$3.87; George Calder, sheep injured, \$10.00; Alex. Ross, sheep killed and injured, \$57.00; John Sinclair, inspecting sheep, \$2.00; J. D. Roberts, use of Hall for judicial purposes, \$5.00; W. A. Reeves, balance of salary, \$25.00, postage \$2.00; Members of Council, inspecting bridges, \$17.00; members of Council, attendance and mileage, Council meeting, \$18.90; B. Gibson, use of room, \$2.00.—Carried.

Council adjourned to meet Tuesday, June 27, at 10 o'clock a.m. for the transaction of general business and to resume the Court of Revision. Court opens at 2 o'clock p.m.

NORMANBY COUNCIL
Council met in the Township Hall, Ayton, on Monday, May 29, at 10 a.m. All the members were present, the Reeve in the chair.

Filsinger—Barber—That the minutes of the last regular meeting as read be adopted.—Carried.

The Clerk gave the oath of office to each member of the Council for the Court of Revision, the Reeve in the chair.

There were four appeals against the Assessor's Roll, namely: John Marshall, Joseph Schoen, John Thompson and Conrad Koehler.

The first three appeals were dismissed.

Conrad Koehler was assessed \$400 business assessment. This business assessment is based on the part of the building used for an office. Mr. Koehler swore he had no office, never had one, never did a business in any part of his house. He had no agencies, had not sold any automobiles, and would not sell any this year. The council accepted the sworn statement of Mr. Koehler and reduced his business assessment from \$400 to \$100.

A few other small changes were made in the Assessor's Roll.

Filsinger—Miller—That the Assessment Roll as corrected and a-

mended by the Court of Revision be accepted as correct, less palpable errors.—Carried.

Miller—Barber—That the request of Charles Damm and others to place a weigh scales on the highway at lot 11, con. 6, east of the church sheds, be granted.—Carried.

Barber—Miller—That the Tennis Club be given the privilege of using a part of the township park as a tennis court.—Carried.

Filsinger—Barber—That the tenders of the Stratford Bridge Company for the three bridges which were advertised, be accepted for the sum of \$4,700, said bridges to be completed not later than October 1, 1922.

Miller—Barber—That Albert Pfeiffer be appointed poundkeeper in the place of George Gerhardt, resigned.—Carried.

The Clerk was instructed to order four road drags from the Sawyer-Massey Company, Hamilton. This will give two drags for every road division, where they must remain.
