THE QUIET HOUR

The United States Commission of Education estimates that during the year 1920, while the world starved, we expended for joy-riding, automobiles, luxurious living, tobacco, jewelry and other unnecessary luxuries, \$22,700,000,000. During the same time we gave to missions to promote Christ's Kingdom abroad \$37,886,-040.00, or comparatively, we expended \$600.00 in luxuries for ourselves and \$1.00 to evangelize the world abroad.

That they may learn how to use their new freedom, men in Brazil are not only encouraging the girls and women of their families to come to the centres maintained by the Young Women's Christian Association there, but they are already sealing their appreciation with financial help.

"Brazilian men see that women are going to get their freedom" writes a representative of the Y.W.C.A. from Brazil. "Mostly they are not unwilling, and they have decided that the Association is a safe organization to teach them how to come out in the world and broaden their interests. Fathers, husbands and friends come in to scrutinize our centres and activities, ask for our printed matter, and having read it and talked it over at home, they appear with the women of their families."

When asked what the church had ever done for workers, Dr. Orchard of London replied that it had given them all their holidays, and also had begun trade unions (guilds). "Let labor remember that the church does not propose to be swallowed up by labor: it proposes to swallow up the labor party. When the church gets going there will not be any need for the labor party. Your place, my labor friend, is in the church of the Carpenter

One of the world's leaders in medical research, Dr. Carrel, asked a group of returning missionaries where the influenza came from. One said Spain, another Russia, several blamed Germany. The doctor replied:

"As far as can be discovered, it first appeared in an obscure corner of the world which had never been swept out, in eastern Turkestan. The spread of the epidemic clear over the earth, taking toll of millions of lives, demonstrates that it is not safe to leave a single plague spot without medical and sanitary aid," Neither is it safe to leave a single thought cell uncontrolled by the will of God, for thoughts produce actions. A thought can go as far, develop as fast, and slay as quickly as an influenza

The Church Federation of Duluth conducted a survey of that city to discover the truth or falsity of the statement that men do not attend church. The survey proves, as did one in Pitts-burgh, that the charge is untrue. Forty-seven per cent. of the church audiences in Duluth were found to be male. It was also discovered that 81 per cent. were wage-earners.

The Duluth Herald made the finding the subject of a leading editorial, and declared that people are now more than ever allied to religious influences, and that there was no ground for the oftmade statement "that few men and fewer wage-earners attended the churches."

Out of 140,000 or more students in the universities and high schools of Germany only 1,200 belong to the Christian student movement, and they have no aggressiveness. Berlin, with a population of four millions, has only five small Y.M.C.A.'s, with a membership of not over 2,000. Church life is equally lacking in life and power.

Dr. Rendel Harris has handed to the British press the narrative by Yechsa Bedresian, of Harput, an Armenian woman, of the horrors she underwent in 1915, with 2,000 others of her townspeople, when the Turks drove them out, made them climb the steep Taurus on hands and feet, and with inhuman cruelty slaughtered the men and boys, took away the young wives and girls, starved and stripped the remaining women, and at last shot down these also, save a very few who miraculously survived. Of 6,000 driven from Harput and other towns, only about 200 were left. It is felt that the ghastly story is too horrible for general reading, but the point is that under the recent agreement at Paris the Armenians' hope of an independent State is dashed and thy are handed back to the Turks with no security but the doubtful commendation to the interest of the League of Nations. The Turk has now again the power to martyrise a people whose flesh has been harrowed up for centuries because of the conflicting interests and policies of the Western Powers, and America's refusal to accept any responsibility for the saving of the lives and liberties of the Armenians.

In an issue of The Messenger, of Melbourne, Australia, recently to hand, there is a statement of the "Present Position and Prospect" with regard to Church Union in the Commonwealth. The report is signed by the Joint Committee of which Professor Andrew Harper is chairman. The statement refers to the vote taken in September, 1920, as "establishing corporate union as the policy to be approved and promoted"; it states the need "that the mind of the Church should be educated and informed as to the greatness of the issues involved"; it reports progress in "co-operation with a view to union"; it commends the action taken by the Canadian General Assembly, with the remark that "thus a path has been blazed for us in Australia along which we may move with assurance and safety."
