Heretofore, all cars were weighed at Palmerston and if overloaded the stone was dumped and the charge of unloading charged back to the plant.

### PASSING OF A PIONEER

The death on Monday last of Mrs. Henry Byers, 80 years of age, removes one of the early pioneers of the Township of Normanby. She settled in the Township with her husband in the early fifties of the last century and resided there continuously to the time of her death. The family consisted of two sons and three daughters, of whom one son, James, died in his boyhood many years ago. The surviving members of the family are: Michael, on the homestead; Mary (Mrs. Lyons), in Toronto; Annie (Mrs. Little), at Ayr, Ontario, and Minnie (Mrs. James Col-linson), in the States.

Mrs. Byers was predeceased by her husband four or five years ago. She was a devoted member of Hampden Presbyterian Church, where, in the adjacent cemetery, her remains were laid to rest yesterday afternoon.

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
