Dr. Hersey, M.P., of Owen Sound, met with an accident last week in the Sun portland cement mill which resulted in his death in the Marine Hospital a few hours later. Death was caused by the bursting of a balance wheel, a piece of which struck him.

The spire of the Presbyterian Church, Priceville, was struck by lightning on Wednesday night of last week. The damage is estimated at \$400 or \$500.

Two of the iron workers at the cement works narrowly escaped death on Monday last through the falling of a scaffold, precipitating them to the ground, a distance of about 25 feet. One had a bone of his arm broken, while the other escaped with a severe shaking up.
