GRAPE POLLINATION
Many Varieties Self-sterile and Need Cross-Pollination.

What Investigational Work Has Shown—Varieties of Self-fertile Sorts Recommended—Eradication of Bladder Campion or Cow Bell.
(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

For years it has been observed by grape growers that certain varieties, typically represented by the Rogers' Hybrids, usually produce straggly, loose bunches, especially where planted in blocks. In the same season and under similar conditions other varieties as Concord and Niagara produce well filled, large bunches. The Rogers' varieties with one exception are self-sterile. Our other commercial varieties are all more or less self-fertile.

Result of Investigational Work.
Considerable investigational work has been done in New York State, in Minnesota, and at Vineland on this problem of self-sterility, with the result that the reason why certain varieties are self-sterile has been established. In our own work, as a result of three years' investigations, we have established the degree of self-fertility and self-sterility of fifty-two varieties of grapes and have ascertained the best pollinators for such self-sterile varieties as Lindley, Salem, Brighton, etc. Our experiments have shown:

1. That insects are the chief agents in the distribution of pollen, wind being a negligible factor.
2. That cross-pollination is absolutely necessary in the case of self-sterile varieties, including Barry, Herbert, Lindley, Massasoit, Salem, Wilder, and Brighton. The Agawam is the only one of the commercially planted Rogers' Hybrids which is self-fertile.
3. That the majority of self-sterile varieties such as Concord, Campbell, Niagara, Worden would produce larger crops of fruit if they were cross-pollinated, though good crops are produced under self-pollination conditions. Campbell often has straggly bunches due to imperfect pollination. Cross-pollination would help.
4. That the self-sterile varieties (Barry, Lindley, etc.) pollinated by any one of the self-fertile varieties (Concord, Niagara, etc.) will set crops of marketable fruit, but that for maximum crops certain self-sterile varieties are better suited as pollinizers for certain self-sterile varieties than others. For Agawam and Brighton, the Worden is the best pollinizer; for Massasoit and Wilder, the Niagara is the best pollinizer; for Salem, the Concord; and for Herbert and Lindley, any of the varieties, Concord, Worden, Niagara, Campbell.

Problems of the Farm
Contributed by Grey County Department of Agriculture

Apple Tree Pruning.
The Grey County Advisory Agricultural Council at a meeting on January 4, 1924, made the following recommendation: That because of numerous requests for apple tree pruners, it is recommended that the Department of Agriculture, Markdale, ascertain the probable number of farmers who would take advantage of the service of practical experts and if possible secure this service for the farmers.

In accordance with this recommendation this article is being sent to all local papers in Grey County. The names of quite a number of practical pruners from the fruit districts has been secured and although their charges have not been learned it is hoped that assistance can be secured for any farmers wanting this help.

Requests will not obligate a farmer in any way but if any desire this service they will be considered according to application. How many Grey County farmers desire their apple trees pruned?

Ready For Spring.
Long ere this every Grey County farmer will undoubtedly have all seed grains cleaned, all harrow teeth sharpened, the plates of the disk tightened, the shears on the cultivator sharpened or reversed and the grain drill all ready for action. It is not now the time to prepare. Give 1924 the best chances to produce a bumper crop.

Orders For School Fair Seeds.
A large number of schools are now sending their orders for seed to the Department of Agriculture, Markdale. The order forms were mailed during January so that it is hoped all applications will be received in the course of another two weeks. The earlier they are sent the easier it will be to supply the orders. We want all the schools this year.

Plowing Matches.
Previous to the annual meetings of the agricultural societies a letter was mailed to the Secretary asking them to consider the advisability of holding a plowing match in their district. With that letter was sent a full statement of the assistance which it would be possible to secure from the Fairs and Associations Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto. To date, very little inquiry has been received. Now is the time to consider this work. Derby Agricultural Society organized last year with the result that they had an exceptional competition. Who will be the next? We will assist if possible.

Legume Inoculation.
The popularity of the Bacteriology Department of the Ontario College is attested by the following statements: During 1923 a total of 4,327 cultures of legume bacteria for seed inoculation were prepared and sent out. Of this number, alfalfa was most frequently asked for, with 1,892; Red Clover, 886; Sweet Clover, 652; Peas,

524; Alsike, 143; Soy Beans, 71; Sweet Peas, 39; Vetch, 31; White Clover, 1.
The creamerymen and the cheesemakers asked for and were supplied with 147 lactic starters, and 63 Bulbarium cultures.
The multiplying influence of the various bacteria sent from the Bacteriological Department during the year, had a very noticeable influence on legumes of the fields and the finished dairy products of the factories.

FROM WIRE TO ETHER WAVE
(Alliston Herald.)
An electrical phenomenon is reported from Mansfield last Saturday evening. Rev. R. K. Burnside was walking along the road almost directly under a line of telephone wires. A voice was heard to exclaim "Britannia Rule the Waves." While it was quite distinct the voice scarcely had the strength of one coming from a person close to him. Mr. Burnside was more surprised than startled and looked at the couple of houses to see if the doors were open thinking that the voice may have come from a gramophone. There were no open doors in sight, so Mr. Burnside, who had become very curious, commenced to investigate. In one of the nearby houses he entered he found the ear piece of a radio set attached to the mouth-piece of a telephone, neighbours hearing the radio over the telephone. This seemed to be a solution of the voice heard, but it offered a new mystery how sound can drop from a bare telephone wire. However, when discussing it with some young radio fans at Mansfield, Mr. Burnside did not appear to be any puzzle to the boys familiar with the radio receiver. "That's nothing," they said, "we often hear telephone conversations of people in the village when we are tuning in." But it is something, as this appears to be the first instance where sound being transmitted over wire has left the wire and been wafted through space on ether waves.
