STRUCK AND KILLED BY A FALLING TREE

Fatality Occurs in Bush Near Mount Forest on Tuesday Afternoon.

Coroner Dr. Reynolds of Mount Forest, visited the scene of the accident and ordered an inquest, which found that Tronreau had died as the result of heart failure and not from accident.
