THE DRINK PROBLEM CAN BE, AND INDEED IS BEING approached from several angles: physical, intellectual, social, economic, municipal, national. But far beyond and above all these is the moral aspect, and Dr. Cherrington, to whose address in Toronto reference was made recently, well emphasized this:

The liquor traffic was a great economic problem, but it was more than these-it was a moral problem. It was not to be solved by Legislative Assemblies or the deliberations of political parties, but by the practical application of the great truths of the Christian Gospel. The touchstone of national greatness was service to humanity, and if the Christian Church marshaled her forces to serve the world in fighting the drink traffic they would prove successful in the end.

It is a simple fact that prohibition would never have reached its present stage of progress but for the efforts of the churches on the temperance question, and for this reason there must be no slackening of work on the part of individual Christians and Christian communities. The problem is at basis a moral one. Men take alcohol because they like it, and it is this personal attitude that creates the peril and points the right way to its removal.

THOSE WHO SPEAK CONTEMPTUOUSLY OF THE BLACK races, arguing their inability ever to achieve the moral and intellectual level of the white, are confounded by such a man as King Khama. Khama proved over more than fifty strenuous years that there is something in the soul of the black man worth training, something in the heart of the black man worth stimulating, and all this to the good of a country where the black man preponderates in teeming millions. Khama owed far less to the influence of European civilization than to something that was born with him long before civilization was known to hm and his people. It was that indefinable thing, almost lacking in name, which we call character. Khama had it, his life expressed it, his actions indorsed it, his death places upon it the stamp of reality.-B. McK. AFTER GAS POISONING

What To Do in Case of Deadly Carbon Monoxide Poisoning.

Despite repeated warnings from vear to year as to the danger of remaining in a tightly-closed garage with the motor running, many motorists yearly sacrifice their lives. Whether it is that motorists, like other people, think that some of these "arm chair" experts do not know what they are talking about. we are not prepared to say, but the net result yearly causes many fatalities. The following rules sent out by the Ontario Safety League may. however, help resuscitate some of the heedless if discovered in time. and we submit them for what they are worth : When rescuing a patient, protect

vourself from the gas by letting fresh air into the premises or you. too, may be overcome. When a man is overcome by gas.

remove him to fresh air quickly and send for a doctor. In the meantime, keep him comfortably warm and do not allow him to become chilledkeep him warm at all times. A chill may cause a strain on his already weakened condition and may cause pneumonia or death. If the patient is even slightly gass-

ed he should not be allowed to make any exertion. If he must be moved, carry him. Keep the patient lying down. To walk him around may injure his heart or even kill him. Keep him quiet. If patient is unconscious, place

him prone (on the floor face downward), this will help to keep his tongue out of his throat. If he is not breathing, or if his breathing stops, start prone pressure method of artificial respiration at once. After consciousness returns, turn him on his back, of more comfortable, but keep him lying down for at least six hours. Do not give artificial respiration if

the patient is breathing. Keep a careful watch to see that he continues to breathe-he may quit at any Give patient oxygen if at hand.
