SOME PEOPLE SAY, "LIFE WOULD BE PLEASANTER IF other people treated me as they should." There is nothing to do about it, so they go on complaining. But others say instead, "Life would be pleasanter if I treated others as I should." This they can do, and things change quickly for the better.

THE QUESTION, "HOW DID YOU FIRST COME TO HEAR of the Gospel?" often brings answers that reveal the methods that are effective. "I saw a man selling books and bought one and read it." "A certain man in our village talked the doctrine "I came to market, and dropped into the chapel." Recently a young man of twenty-two or so was examined. When asked this question he said a certain man read a portion of the Bible to him, and said it was a fine book. The young man took home a Gospel portion and a catechism, and he said, "As soon as I read it I saw it was the truth, and I believed."

DR. G. CAMPBELL MORGAN ONCE STATED THAT HE HAD read the Bible from beginning to end at pulpit rate in sixty hours. A correspondent of The Church Family Newspaper made the same experiment, and completed his reading in seventy-six hours, which was spread over a period of eighty-one days. He states that if ordinary people devoted half as much time to the Bible as they give to a newspaper they could easily read the Bible through in three months without undue effort. He adds: "How many Christians are there who have never read the Bible through once? Yet at my slow rate of reading it can be read through comfortably in a year at the rate of fifteen minutes a

"A CHANGE HAS COME IN THE GONGO. WE HAVE FIVE great concessions now throughout the Kasai Valley. Since King Albert has come to the throne things have changed altogether. He is building railroads, bridges, hospitals and schools. He is doing all that he can for the natives of the Congo. There are now five great mission stations, with 65 white missionaries in the five stations and over nine hundred native evangelists, who are also school teachers. Thirty years ago they had not heard of the sabbath day: now the sabbath day is kept beautifully all through the country.'

HE WAS A LITLE NAKED, IGOROT BOY. THE FUTURE held in store for him nothing more than a mere existence, the wearing toil of wresting a scant living from the rocky soil of his mountain home. He lived in a little thatched, conical-shaped hut, the door a hole through which he crawled on hands and knees,-a house with no ventilation, no light, but much dirt and filth. And then the Christian church came to the mountains. It took this little wretched Igorot boy into the day school of the mission. He learned the story of the Master, and it inspired him with a desire to serve his fellowmen. He grew in stature and wisdom. He entered the university in Manila. And now Dr. Hilary Clapp has gone back into the mountains of Luzon to minister to the bodies of his people, the Igorots of Luzon!

THE JOURNALS OF THE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST THROW into relief a statement made by Lloyd George during his recent visit: "I learned all my democracy from Alexander Campbell and Abraham Lincoln." Campbell was a contemporary of Lincoln, and while the latter worked for political freedom the former evolved his ideas of Christian union and spiritual democracy which are inherited by the Disciples of Christ.

A STORY ABOUT THE LATE BISHOP OF CHELMSFORD. Dr. Watts-Ditchfield, has just received fresh currency. When he was rector of the East London slum parish of St. James's Bethnal Green, he had a splendid meeting for men every Sunday afternoon. But there was a certain working man who remained impervious to the earnestness and influence of the rector, and usually the man contrived to be out when Mr. Watts-Ditchfield called. On one such occasion the visitor, admitted by a friendly wife, caught a glimpse of a cage in a back room with a squirrel in it. "How came that here?" asked the rector. "Why, sir," was the reply, "my husband just 'dotes' on squirrels." On his return home, Mr. Watts-Ditchfield called at the public library and within a few days what he did not know about squirrels "was not worth knowing." Armed with this information, he carefully timed his next call and found the man at home feeding his squirrel. The result can be told in the words of a recent narrator of the story: "The stronghold of indifference and opposition was carried by assault. It was a bloodless victory, won on the common ground of a shared interest. The man who could talk such uncommonly good sense about squirrels must surely be able to say something equally worth hearing about religion.' The Bishop was dominated by two great principles and motives: love to Christ and love for the souls of men.

A TIMELY WORD WAS SPOKEN BY HON. N. W. ROWELL when he expressed the opinion that the minister of the Gospel can exercise great influence on the problems of the world: "The minister of the Gospel had it in his power to play a large part. The longer he lived the more he was convinced of the important place that the Church must take in the lives of men and women, and it was there that people looked for guidance and help at the present time." Criticisms of the ministry and of the Church are heard so frequently that (whether justified or not) it is all the more welcome and refreshing to have a testimony like this. Not long ago a leading layman criticized the ministry very severely to a Bishop, and poured scorn on the type of man often heard in our pulpits. The Bishop replied: "Well, they were all laymen once, and we are doing the best we can with the material you send us."

IT IS BECAUSE SO MANY CHURCHES ARE AUDIENCES rather than brotherhoods that thousands of Christians, on changing their place of residence, drop out of church connections altogether. Their old church membership meant nothing to them, and therefore membership in another church has no attraction for them .- Dr. Charles E. Jefferson.

AT THE INSTALLATION OF A FRIEND, DR. JOHN A. HUTTton introduced the new minister to the church in these words: "I hope you will be very good to him, kind to his thinking and hospitable to his new ideas. Life is very hard to-day for any good minister. A friend of mine," continued the Doctor, "whom I consider to be the greatest living preacher in the English language-an American he is,-wrote to me lately: 'Hutton, I am being bombarded with calls, offers of tens of thousands of dollars' salaries, secretaries, automobiles, and long vacations. wish some congregation would have the ingenuity to invite me to be their minister, offering me nothing but their love.'....This is what I ask of you for my friend."
