SOME FOAL DISEASES

Two Stomach Troubles That Try the Youngsters.

Acute Indigestion and Its Treatment.—Cause, Symptoms and Treatment of Gastric Impaction—Sunflower Stalks—It's a Great Feeling.

Acute Indigestion.

This trouble is frequently seen at weaning time, during the rush of spring work when the brood mares that are nursing young foals are required to labor in the field. The mare becomes overheated at work and may be away from the foal for five or six hours. When she comes in at noon or night and the colt is given opportunity to nurse, conditions are not normal in that there is an oversupply of milk, or more milk than is good for a hungry colt at one time, and the milk is also probably altered somewhat due to the overheating of the body during labor in the field.

The colt becomes dull, may have abdominal pain, lies down a great deal of the time, loses appetite, may be noticed grinding its teeth, or with purulent discharge from the eyes.

Prevention is the most desirable course, and this disorder can be kept down by creating normal conditions for the mare and foal. If the mare must work, care should be taken not to overheat her in harness, and not to keep her away from the foal for more than three or four hours. If her udder is distended and painful, milk part of the contents away by hand before permitting the colt to nurse. The sanitary conditions about the stable or lot should be the best, and the food that is being given to the mare should be such as to promote a normal, healthy milk flow.

What killed the colt? A number of foals are lost each year in every district through gastric impaction, a disorder occurring during the first week following weaning in foals that are weaned too young. The foal's stomach has been dealing with milk pretty much during the first three months and it has not developed a condition that will permit of the successful handling of coarse feeds.

The colt that is weaned too early in life is at a disadvantage. It has depended upon its mother for the greater part of its food and also protection. If suddenly deprived of its mother the colt gets quite a shock. It may not have learned to drink and feed by itself, and may not know the whereabouts of the feed and water supply.

Colts that have been with their stabled dams usually know the ways of the stable. But the colt that has run out in the pasture field with its mother all its life has not had an opportunity of such experience, and consequently is at a loss when suddenly taken from the dam, separated from its mother, and placed in a new environment.

The colt after separation is excited and may fret for a few days, refusing feed, or eating and not drinking. Symptoms, which usually occur four or five days after weaning. The colt may lie down a good deal of the time, grunts, becomes restless, shows head irregular, some distension of flank, pain evidenced on touching region of stomach, temperature may be sub-normal at start and increases later, becomes sleepy and stupid, staggy gait. Post mortem shows the stomach to be full, much enlarged, walls thin and pale in color and the contents a doughy mass.

Treatment.—If the colt has reached a point of development where the colt is sleepy, stupid and staggy in gait, little can be done. The earliest stages can be relieved by the application of mustard, hot blanket, or amoniacal liniment to the abdomen of the colt, warm enemas given. Encourage colt to drink by putting sugar on back of mouth. Give hay tea, strong coffee, hypophosphate of soda and abundant warm water. Purgatives are of little use. Friction to or kneading the abdomen gives some relief. Water is very important.

The weaning of colts should be gradual, and not until the colt is well versed in the ways of feeding and the whereabouts of feed. A little attention given to the colt a month ahead of the time that it is decided to separate it from its mother will save considerable trouble later.

The Sunflower Stalks. The pith of sunflower stalks is said to be the lightest vegetable substance. Dried sunflower pith is in fact ten times lighter than cork.

In central Russia where the pith is extensively cultivated every part of the plant is put to some use. The pith in particular is carefully removed from the stalk and used in making life saving appliances.

Our Canadian Quizz Corner

Canada and the White Plague. Q.—What was Canada's record in dealing with the White Plague of tuberculosis?

A.—Canada leads Great Britain and the United States in a low tuberculosis death rate with a rate per 100,000 of 84.4 per cent. The deaths in 1922 were lower than in 1921. Canada has spent \$11,000,000 on sanatoria.

Mount Bagot. Q.—After whom is Mount Bagot, in British Columbia, named?

A.—Mount Bagot, a peak over 7,000 feet high in British Columbia near the Alaskan Boundary. It is named after Sir Charles Bagot, the British Ambassador to Russia and plenipotentiary on the Alaskan Boundary Commission.

Q.—Who was La Salle? A.—Rene Robert, Cavalier De La Salle came to Canada in 1666 from Normandy and received a seigneurie from the Sulpician Fathers. He was one of the great French explorers of New Canada in his search for a passage to China. He built the first boat on Lake Erie and explored the Mississippi to its mouth and was murdered in 1687 on his way north by some of his men.

Canada's Farm Live Stock Value. Q.—What is the value of Canada's farm live stock?

A.—According to the Census Bureau Canada's value in horses, cattle, sheep and swine in 1923 was estimated at \$613,263,000—a decrease over previous years owing to reduced prices.

Vrooman's Battery. Q.—Where is Vrooman's battery, and what is its history?

A.—Vrooman's Battery, on the Niagara River, near Queenston Heights in the battle of Queenston fought on October 13, 1912. A tablet marked the place and reads as follows. Site of Vrooman's battery engaged in the battle of Queenston Heights, October 13th, 1812. The gun mounted here fired 112 rounds on that day.

The Jesuit Martyrs. Q.—Who were the Jesuit martyrs?

Alberta As a Prize-winner.

Q.—Where does Alberta stand as a prize winner in live stock and crops? Her production of 6,000,000 bushels of wheat in 1906 increased to 167,000,000 in 1923 and she now leads all the provinces in coal production with reserves of 14 per cent of the world's coal, and 21 per cent, on this continent, 72 per cent of the Empire, and 87 per cent of the Dominion.
