MUNICIPAL OFFICERS FORM ASSOCIATION

Met At Owen Sound on Thursday of of Last Week and Elected Officers.

The Grey County Municipal Officers' Association is the official name of a new organization which sprung into being in Owen Sound Thursday morning of last week. It is composed of the clerks, treasurers, auditors, and assessors of the various townships in the County of Grey, and the inaugural meeting was held at the Council Chamber at Owen Sound. The idea has been working in the minds of some of the officials for quite a long while, but it remained for Mr. John R. Philp, treasurer of the Township of Egrement, to send out the notices and call them together. When the meeting opened at 11 o'clock in the morning there were nearly thirty present, and after an informal discussion it was decided to complete the organization.

W. J. Bellamy, Clerk of Artemesia and Flesherton, was voted to the chair, and G. G. Albery, Clerk of St. Vincent and Meaford, was appointed secretary for the meeting.

- A number expressed themselves as being heartily in favor of action of this kind, and it might be stated that the object is the betterment of the conditions of the township officials generally, both as regards business

and pleasure. The session in the morning was a regular get-acquainted one, and the officials introduced themselves to each other. It was suggested by one of the clerks that one of the matters which might be taken up was that of recognition by the Government as far as the getting of a standard wage was concerned, uniformity in their work, etc. They are also looking at the social side of the matter, and feel that by getting better acquainted with each other they will be better enabled to undertake the carrying out of their duties.
