Ferguson also reported that he had examined the Drury bridge, also the portion of land at bend of the river where in the year 1920 the engineer recommended the cutting of a new channel in order to give the water a straight course for the bridge. The west abutment of the bridge is so badly washed out that there is great danger of it being completely undermined with another spring freshet. The west bank of the river is so badly washed out that the digging of a channel as recommended would be of no use. The money spent in digging the channel would bring better results by filling the washout with large boulders up to the abutment and for some distance out; in my humble opinion this should be done, also examined culvert a short distance east of the bridge. It needs considerable repairing. Would recommend that these matters be attended to by the Council as soon as possible. Also made provision to have culvert on 20th Sideroad between Cons. 4 and 5 covered.

**MAIL SERVICE FROM WEST NOT INTERRUPTED BY STRIKE**  
 Toronto Appears Chief Storm Centre for Canada, With Most Postmen On Strike.  
 We are pleased to acknowledge remittance from Mr. Guy L. Williams of Tisdale, Sask., and are further pleased to learn that the weather there is so fine and crops so good. There has been considerable rain in that locality and this is one of the great essentials for a good crop in the West. His letter was dated at Tisdale on the 18th of June, bore the Tisdale postmark of same date, and reached Durham June 21 on the night train.  
 This, in the face of a postal strike, is excellent service and shows that some of the mail at least is moving with little or no interruption.  
 This is quite a contrast with a letter mailed us from Schomberg, 35 miles from Toronto, on June 17, and did not reach Durham until Saturday night, the 21st inst.
