**AGNES MACPAIL, M. P. CAUSED SENSATION IN HOUSE OF COMMONS**

Asked That Entire \$400,000 in Militia Estimates Be Removed.

Concluding in Commons Friday night an impassioned, able plea for the demilitarization of the public school curriculum in Canada, Agnes Macpail, Progressive, Southeast Grey, moved that the item of \$400,000 in the defence estimates, covering cadet training, be decreased by the entire amount. Although the motion was defeated on a standing vote 73 to 33, its mover precipitated in a common house a tempestuous conflict of opinion, unsurpassed this year in warmth and bitterness.

Miss Macpail spoke without heroes or hysterics, basing her remarks largely upon an account in a newspaper of an Empire celebration in Toronto this summer.

We went overseas to kill Prussianism," said Miss Macpail in discussing this item, "and like small pox, we caught it."

Her plea would have gone unheeded by the sleepy House, had not the latter been stirred by the reported interruptions of the member for Hants, L. H. Martell.

During the speech of the member for South-east Grey, which came in the nature of a stinging reply to the Conservative criticisms of the defence estimates on the ground that they were inadequate, the member for Hants called out, more than once, "Go to Russia."

No sooner had Miss Macpail sat down than the Minister of Defense, Hon. E. M. MacDonald, arose in a heated reply. The country, he said, would put little stock in the arguments, such as she had advanced, and well it was for Canada that not all her citizens had Miss Macpail's opinion.

Then came Mr. Martell. The time had not come, he said, for Parliament to be taught its duties by propagandists for or representatives of Soviet Russia.

T. G. McBride, Progressive, Carleton Place, came out strongly in support of the cadet movement, but it was criticized by Robert Forke, Progressive leader, who declared that military training was one of the greatest evils of the day.

## AUTO LIGHTING LAW TO BE ENFORCED

Garage Owners, Too, Must Live Up To Requirements of Motor Vehicles Act.  
Mr. R. M. Wallace, the Provincial officer in charge of motor traffic on the highway from Guelph to Owen Sound, has informed us that some one is going to get into trouble in the very near future for infractions of the Motor Vehicles Act, especially in the matter of tail- and head-lights. On Saturday night last, he said, between Durham and Mount Forest, there were no less than fifty-four motor vehicles running on the highway with either no tail-light, or with one head-light out, and were a positive menace to traffic.

Mr. Wallace says he has issued several warnings to drivers, but from now on he would be forced to take legal action if the nuisance is not looked after.

Last week he also received a letter from the Department requesting him to check up on all garages and see that employees and others operating motor vehicles without the necessary professional chauffeur's license were warned to procure the necessary papers at once. Drivers of commercial vehicles, too, must have chauffeur's licenses or are liable to fine.

This ruling affects all those who drive delivery trucks of any kind, garage employees or others who drive motor vehicles for hire or who drive other people's cars on the highway for testing or other purposes.

Since coming on this beat this summer, Mr. Wallace has been very decent in the performance of his duties and it is to be hoped the public will help him out in keeping the highway safe for traffic. As he says, it is not his law; he is here merely to enforce it, and would like to do so with as little friction as possible.
