G. B. Smith of Ayton discussed the rabbit question and put in an eloquent plea for the protection of the swamp hare. He said that now the season for shooting rabbit or hare was open all the year. He did not think this fair. The rabbit or swamp hare should be protected and a distinction made between it and the cotton-tail rabbit.

At this juncture Mr. Rapsey of the Game and Fisheries Department was asked for information. Mr. Rapsey said that the Department always tried to find out the wishes of the people as a whole and that the Fish and Game Committee would then make recommendations to the Government. He said that as a whole the people of the province want an open season. He referred to the imported rabbits, the Belgian hare, and said it had done enormous damage to agricultural products in some parts of the country.







