LOOK FOR LUNGWORMS

An Annoying Disease Too Common Among Pigs

Nature and Development of the Illness—Treatment—Preventive Measures—Autumn Cutting of Alfalfa—Harness and Belting.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

Nature and Development of the Disease.

It is commonly known as lung-worm disease, due to the presence of small thread-like worms in the air tubes of the lungs setting up pneumonia. The worm causing this disease is named the "Metastrongylus apri" and is also known as the "Strongylus paradoxus." These worms locate in the air tubes of the lungs, where they deposit their ova or eggs in great numbers. The ova as well as the embryos or young worms are then expelled from the air passages with the secretions and discharges from the nostrils, while some are coughed up and expelled from the mouth during spells of coughing, or else swallowed and expelled with the feces. This accounts for a widespread contamination of the floors of the pens and the ground in the lots and yards containing affected pigs. Small pools of water are also liable to become contaminated. In these different places the larvae develop, and from time to time become more or less a menace. Infection usually takes place with feed and water in hog pastures, lots and pens which have become contaminated by affected pigs. In turn the parasites invade the air passages of the infected pigs, and there reach sexual maturity setting up the disease in the lungs. Once a place becomes contaminated with these parasites, the infection remains dangerous for a long time, because the affected animals keep on furnishing fresh infective material. As a result the disease gradually becomes more or less permanently established on certain premises. Stagnant pools of water, moist poorly drained yards, and dirty pens, favor the development of the infection. Young sucking pigs may also become infected from the udder of the sow through contamination of its surface. Young pigs, a few months old, are the most easily infected, and suffer the worst until after they are four months old.

Autumn Cutting of Alfalfa.

In the Field Husbandry department of the Ontario Agricultural College alfalfa has been under test for twenty-six consecutive years. In each of twenty-four years the alfalfa gave three cuttings per annum. In 1907 two cuttings, and in 1896 four cuttings were produced in the one season. The spring of 1896 opened up very early and that of 1907 very late. The third cuttings were made on September 17th in the average of the twenty-four years. It is important to cut alfalfa before the 20th of September so as to enable the crop to make a good growth before the approach of winter. So says Dr. C. A. Zavitz of the Ontario Agricultural College.

Harness and Belting.

It is important to note that any leather improperly used, or neglected, will deteriorate rapidly. For example, belts for driving machinery often become impaired, if not useless, in a very few years whether on straight drives or not, but when they are kept clean and oiled they will last ten to thirty years. Apply the grease lightly to driving harness and more liberally to work harness. The grease or oil should be rubbed thoroughly into the leather while it is still damp from washing.

Problems of the Farm

Canadian Bacon Abroad.

The following extract of a letter was received from the Co-operation and Markets branch, Department of Agriculture, Toronto. "Bacon is a fairly firm market. The highest price for Canadian bacon was 97 shillings a cwt, when we wrote a month ago. Canadian bacon was as follows:—leanest 86 to 97 shillings a cwt. of 112 pounds; heavy sides 82 to 97; and light sides 84 to 92. Canadian cured American is not quoted this week, while leanest American sides are 72 to 78 shillings. Best Irish is as high as 114 shillings a cwt, and best Danish 110 shillings.

It is rather interesting to observe that the present prices for Irish and Danish bacon are two or three shillings a cwt, lower than the prices ruling during the corresponding period of last year, while Canadian is two to four shillings higher all round than was the case a year ago. This seems to indicate that the position of Canadian bacon is improving in this market, although there are those of us who think that the margin between the prices of Canadian and those of Danish and Irish are still wider than they ought to be.

This would indicate that the grading of hogs is having its effect upon improving the quality of Canadian bacon which in turn results in more demand with the subsequent higher prices.

Destroying Groundhogs

One of the worst nuisances which is encountered during haying and harvesting operations are the numerous groundhog holes found in the fields. This pest is easily destroyed by purchasing in the drug store, some carbon bisulphide and after pouring it on a rag throw this soaked rag into the burrows covering the hole with a stone or earth. About one teaspoonful is all that is necessary in each hole.

The fumes of the carbon bisulphide is heavier than air, consequently will settle to the bottom of the hole, destroying the animals. Carbon bisulphide can be purchased in any drug store. It is very cheap hence can be used by every farmer troubled with groundhogs.

Results of Egg Circle Work

Below are articles taken from the Egg Circle bulletin published by the Egg Circle members of Prince Edward Island. They show results which are highly gratifying and which can be duplicated in Ontario if farmers will get behind this scheme.

Facts and Figures

Yearly receipts of eggs of the Prince Edward Island Co-operative Eggs and Poultry Association have been as follows:—

Receipts of eggs for the eight weeks ending February 23 are almost double the receipts during the same period last year. To be exact, receipts are ninety per cent greater to the date mentioned.

Prices of eggs have been higher since January 1, 1924 than last year. The average price advanced for extras January 1 to February 23 this year was 43 cents, or a difference of six cents per dozen.

THE SPANISH DANCER PHOTOPLAY TELLS STORY OF INTEREST

Don Cesar escapes just as the police arrive to arrest him. Meeting Maritana, he accuses her of theft. She displays her wound received in fighting for the purse, and when he begs her forgiveness, she is about to spurn him when the pursuing police appear in sight. Don Cesar mounts behind the girl and they ride away. Later, the two separate, with the understanding that they are to meet in Madrid the next day.

King Philip IV, who is jealous of his queen, consults with Lasques about painting his portrait. Several courtiers plan to take advantage of the apparent indiscretions of the queen. The queen goes riding with her little son and when the prince's pony runs away, Maritana saves him and receives a beautiful scarf from her majesty who tells her that if she needs help, to send it back to her. FATTENING TURKEYS

Fattening turkeys, says a circular issued by the Dominion Experimental Farms, is a very simple operation which increases the value of the birds, as it increases their weight and improves the quality of the flesh. Turkeys that have been well fed may be fattened at about six or seven months old, when cold weather starts in, a little before Thanksgiving Day for instance. Restrict their run at first, advises the circular, so that they may get used gradually to live in a small yard or in a small house, but large enough to permit them to take a little exercise. It should never be forgotten that turkeys are of a roving nature and that close housing does not agree with them.

Fattening takes about six weeks. During the first four, it is sufficient to give a ration composed of grain or mash, not too thick nor too thin; as much of it as they like, but only enough for one meal should be prepared at one time. Oats, barley and cornmeal may enter in large proportion in the composition of this ration. Cooked mashed potatoes, mixed with milk will help to produce a white flesh. Turkeys may also be fattened with good grain distributed twice a day and a little grain at noon. Mix with the mash a little fine gravel, and always keep fresh water before the birds. Towards the end of the fattening period, grease or scraps of cooked meat may be added to the ration.

Male turkeys, adds the circular, do not fatten so easily as females, nor is the meat so tender, but they become larger. Cleanliness at all stages is one great desideratum in keeping turkeys.
