hope for Canada, while Mr. MacNicol declared that the fine spirit of Conservative activity which he had found in and around Eugenia Falls was reflected all over the West. It pervaded the Dominion to the Pacific Coast, he declared, for the people were sick and tired of the results of the King Government maladministration which they found on every side of them.

Mr. Henry. In presenting a general sketch of progress during the past year since the election of the Conservative Government in Ontario, Hon. George S. Henry, Ontario minister of public works and highways, pointed out that Hon. Howard Ferguson is a prime minister, who, contrary to his predecessor, is not afraid to assume the responsibility for the actions of all his ministers. Touching on the O.T.A. plebiscite, the speaker recalled that in his pre-election speeches the premier had promised a vote when the time seemed ripe and now that the time appears ripe the Government is ready to accept full responsibility. It will trust the people and it realizes that the people have confidence in themselves to express what they desire. The Government, he added, will carry out to the uttermost the views of the majority.
