preserved. The ivory is utilized by the Eskimos for manufacturing various native implements, while the hides are used to build summer huts.

## Seeks Divorce---Prefers Hills



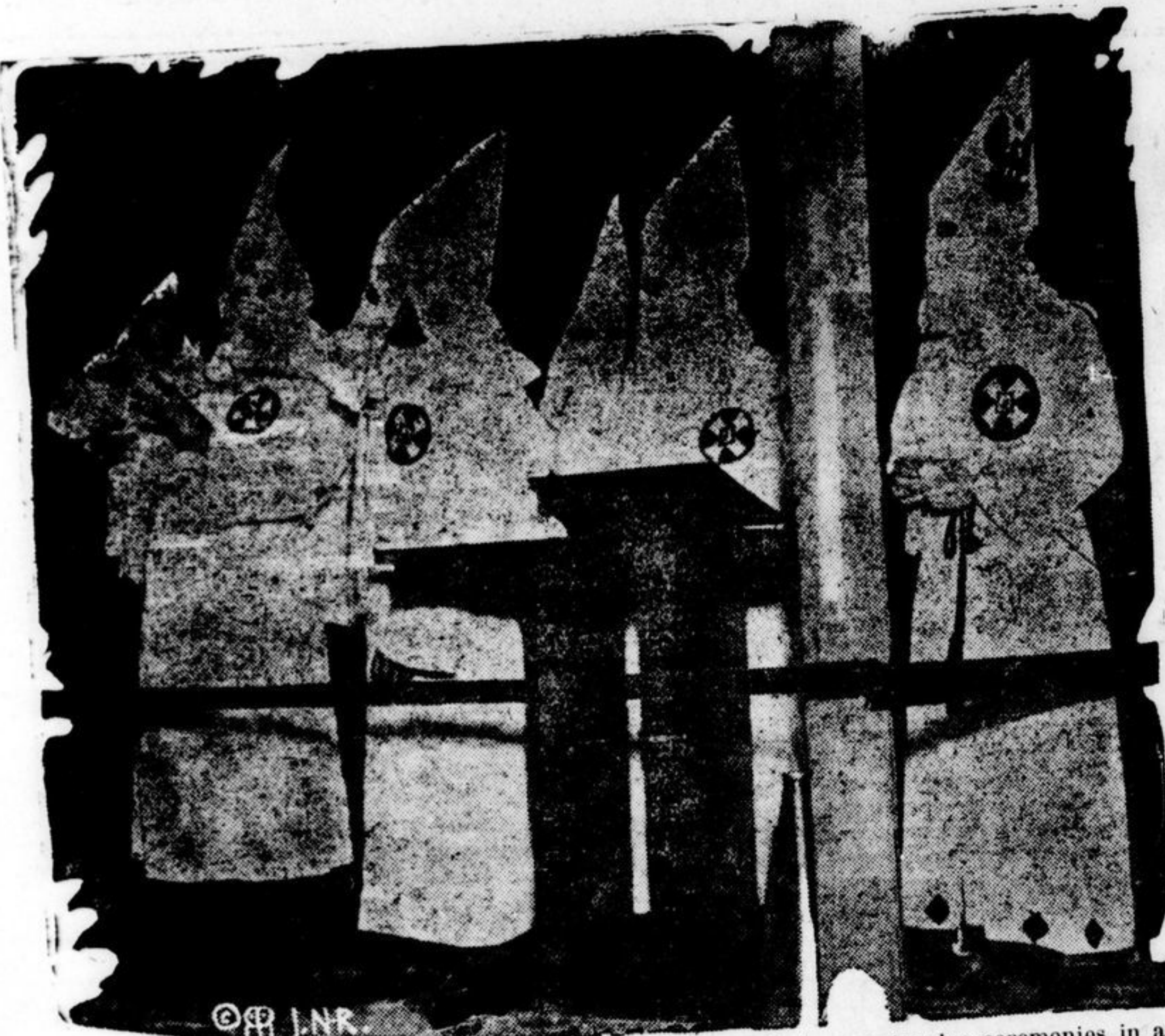

## Cow Assumes Parental Duties To Baby Faun

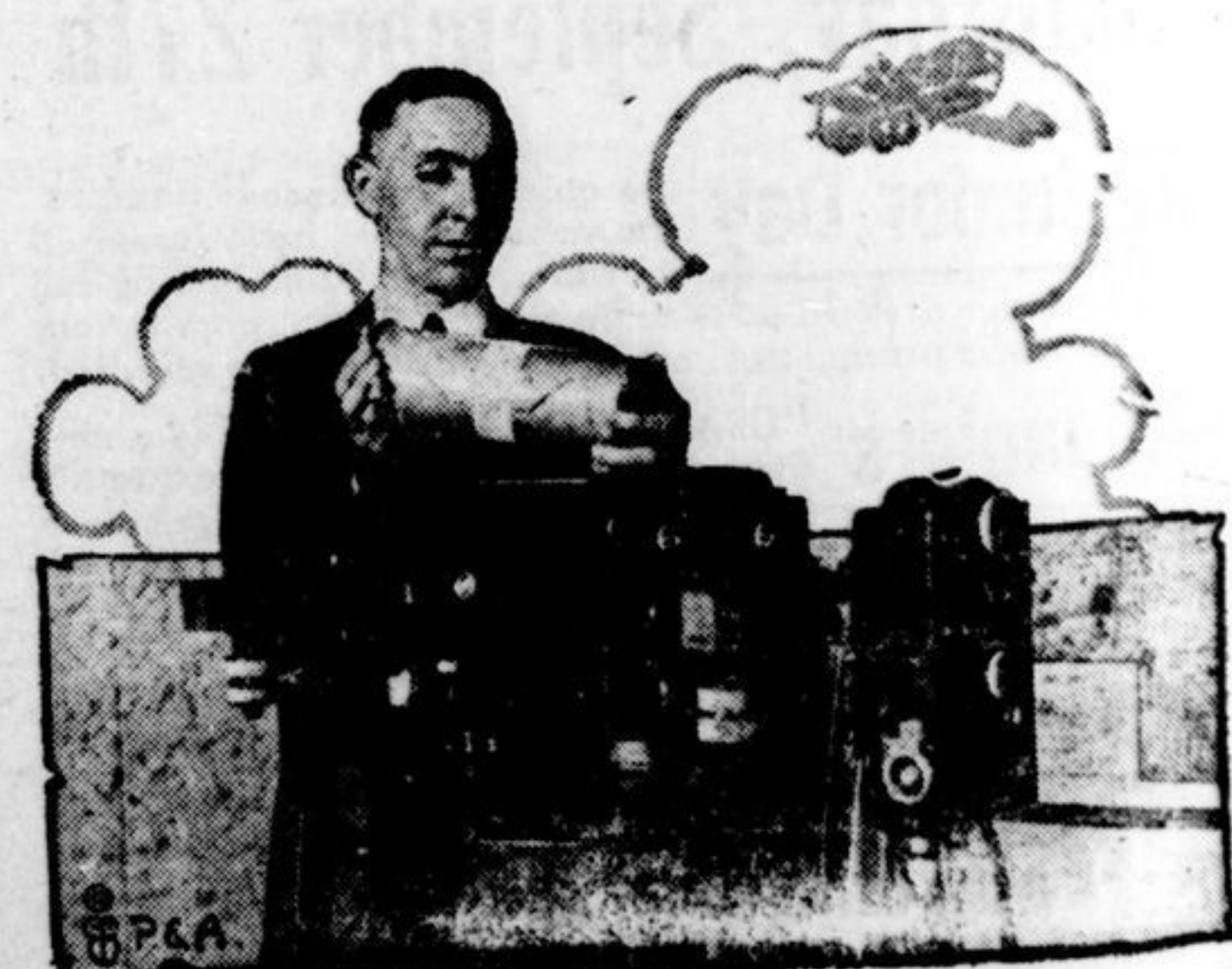


KINDNESS and affection amongst animals is not an uncommon sight but—here's a rather odd example. When this baby faun lost its mother, a cow on a dairy farm

## An Aerial Camera



THIS mechanical contrivance is a new type Aeronautical Camera designed for the purpose of photographing the United States from the air. It is to be carried in the planes of members of the United States Air Service who very shortly will snap "birds-eye" views of all the principal cities in this country. Those photographs will later be assembled in complete photographic maps. The photo shows Lieut. C. P. McDermott holding one of the rolls of film used in the odd picture-making machine. The camera is automatic and makes 120 exposures—18x24 C. M. with one loading. The film is a supersensitized roll and the negatives can be made at any altitude as the new film filters do away with all aerial haze.
