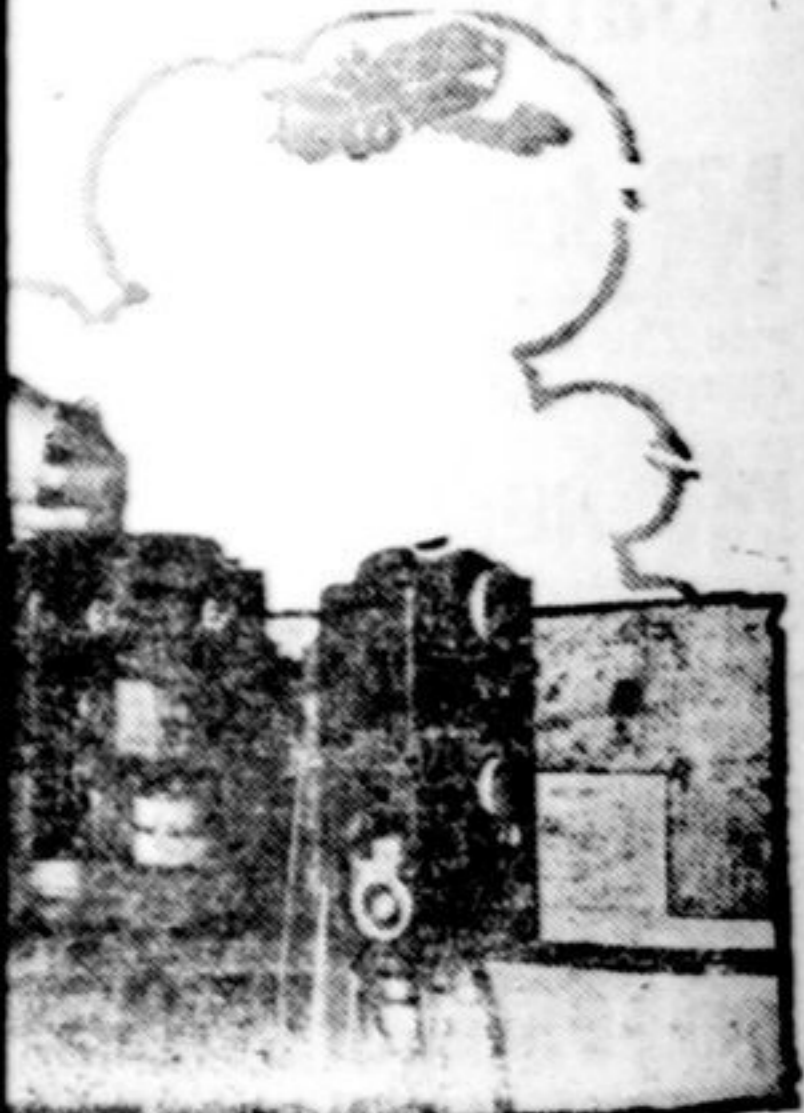

TREES FALL PLANTED

How They Compare With the Spring Planted Trees

Pears, Plums and Sweet Cherries Do Well — Dug vs. Dynamited Holes for Planting—The Appeal of the Tree—Rainfall and Potato Rot—The Great Oat Crop.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

Experiments to determine, for the Niagara Peninsula, the relative merits of fall and spring planting of pears, plums and sweet cherries were started at the Horticultural Experiment Station, Vineland, in 1914 and 1915. Complete records of growth and fruitfulness have been kept for each season so that the evidence we now have is fairly conclusive.

Pears, Plums and Sweet Cherries Do Well.

Severally speaking for pears, plums and sweet cherries fall planting has resulted in the least number of deaths, and has given a somewhat greater growth of trees, both during the first season and thereafter. At no time, however, have the differences been very great, though they have been sufficiently marked to warrant fall planting, providing well matured trees can be secured from the nurseries. Trees dug too early and with unripened wood are apt to suffer from winter injury. In some seasons, owing to weather conditions which stimulate late growth, it is practically impossible to secure well-matured nursery stock. After such seasons spring planting would probably be preferable.

A probable reason for the fewer number of deaths in fall planted than in spring planted trees is that the roots of the fall planted trees are not subjected to drying out as are the roots of trees held over until spring.

Dug vs. Dynamited Holes for Planting.

In conjunction with the fall vs. spring planting, experiment trees were also planted in ordinary dug holes, and in dynamited holes. This experiment was carried on, of course, in heavy soil. The general size, health and vigor of the trees in the various plantings seemed to indicate that the trees set in holes immediately after dynamiting were for some cause weakened and delayed in growth. This was attributed to the rapid drying out of the soil immediately following dynamiting, which delayed the starting of the trees. To overcome this difficulty the experiment was continued with the addition of trees planted in holes dynamited in the fall and allowed to fill with water and settle over winter.—Hort. Exp. Station, Vineland Station.

Travellers in Portugal report that in many places where timber trees are to be found—in woods, parks, and gardens—one sees the following inscription, headed "To the Wayfarer":

Ye who pass by and would raise your hand against me, harken ere you harm me.

Rainfall Affecting Potato Rot.

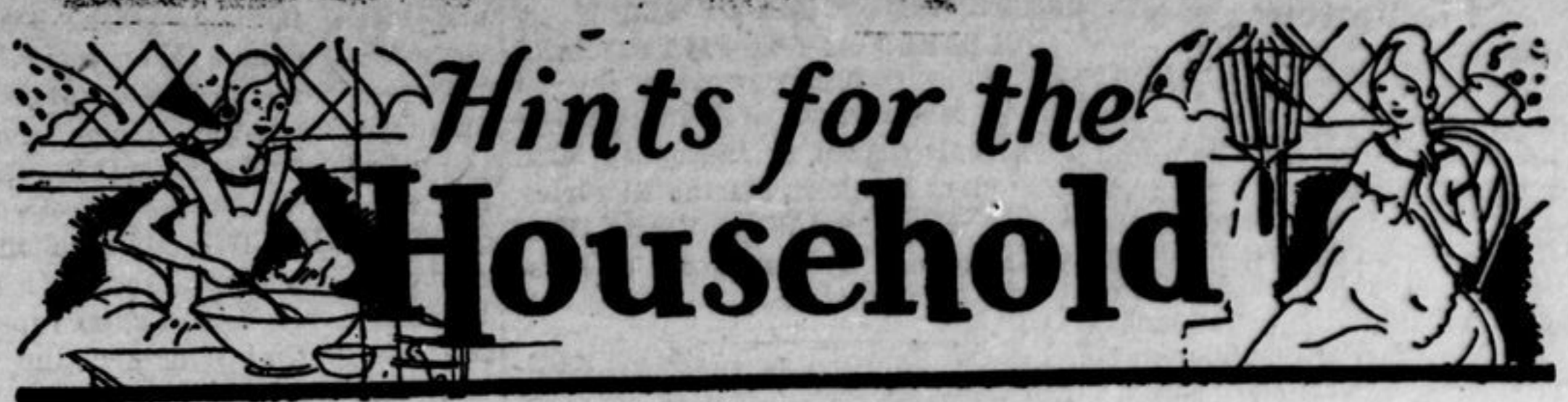
Very careful records of the rainfall at the College have been kept by the Department of Agricultural Physics in each of the past sixteen years. In comparing the amount of rainfall during the months of July, August and September with the amount of rot in the potato crop in each of the past sixteen years some interesting information has been obtained. The annual amount of rainfall for the three months referred to for the eight years in which there was no rot was 7.1 inches, for the four years when there was a moderate amount of rot 9.8 inches, and for the four years in which the rot was abundant 11.7 inches. The amount of rainfall, therefore, appears to have a very marked influence in making conditions favorable or unfavorable for the development of rot.—Dept. of Extension, O. A. C., Guelph.

Ontario's Greatest Grain Crop.

In 1923 oats were grown more extensively in Ontario than all other grains combined. It is probably safe to say that three-quarters of the oats which are now grown in this Province are of the O. A. C. No. 72 and the Banner varieties. According to extensive experiments and accumulated records at the College at Guelph and in Western, Eastern and Northern Ontario, the O. A. C. No. 72 has surpassed the Banner in both quantity of grain and yield of grain per acre. The differences between these two varieties, it applied to the oat lands of Ontario, would mean millions of dollars annually in favor of the O. A. C. No. 72.—Dept. of Extension, O. A. C., Guelph.

Hints for the Household

PRESERVING HINTS

Grape Jelly Wash and stem grapes. Cook grapes down. Then strain. To every cup of juice add 1 cup of sugar. Bring to the boiling point and then boil exactly 20 minutes. Put in glasses and seal after it has set.

Grape Conserve

1 pound of grapes 1/2 pound of sugar 1 cup of chopped raisins 1 cup of chopped nuts Bring the grapes and sugar to a boil. Then boil ten minutes—add nuts and raisins and cook another ten minutes.

Rhubarb Marmalade

1 quart of raw rhubarb cut in small pieces 4 seedless oranges 3 pounds of sugar 1 tablespoon of lemon juice 1 tablespoon of grated orange rind Put all in a preserving kettle. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Cook slowly until thick. This takes about two hours. Strawberries, sugar and rhubarb, cooked together this way, makes a wonderful jam.

COOKING HINTS

Gold cooked liver, kidney or steak mixed with salad dressing makes a

fine sandwich paste. Where tomato sauce is called for, it is very much quicker to use canned tomato soup.

Save canned pineapple juices to flavor corn starch pudding. Black walnuts give to dishes a deliciously different flavor that any hostess loves to obtain.

Black walnuts add immensely when served with fruit salad. Salted Black Walnuts and Pecans make an agreeable change for the nut dish.

Lump Saver

When gravy, cream sauce or custards lump, beat vigorously with egg beater for a moment and lumps will disappear.

Date Souffle

2 eggs 1 cup of sugar 1 teaspoon of baking powder 1 cup of walnuts quartered 1 cup of dates seeded and cut in two Mix in order written. Bake about 1/2 hour in moderate oven. Serve with whipped cream.

A New Meat Loaf

This meat loaf is good either hot or cold. Take—1 pound of uncooked ham, ground 1 pound of fresh pork, ground 1 cup of soft bread crumbs 1 cup of milk 1 or two eggs well beaten, a

little onion and some pepper (no salt) Bake in slow oven for one hour.

THINGS WORTH KNOWING

To Steam Velvet

As the winter months approach we are all thinking of clothes. Some of our old velvet dresses or goods could be economically put to use if we only knew how to steam them. Here is a method:—

Heat an iron and place it on its side. Fold several thicknesses of wet cloth over the iron and as soon as the steam begins to rise, draw the velvet slowly back and forth across the edge of the iron, right side up. As soon as the mark caused by crushing disappears place the velvet on a smooth surface to dry.

Stained Glasses

Stained glasses are very nearly as undesirable as nicked china. The nicked china can not be made right, but the stained glasses can.

Take either a mixture of vinegar and salt or lemon and salt and rub well over the stain. Then wash thoroughly and glass will resume its clearness.

Use for Clothes Pins

Use pinch clothes pins for pinning bed room curtains back. The clothes pins can be made to blend with colors in the room.

OWEN SOUND PRO LAYS OUT COURSE FOR HANOVER CLUB

Hanover and Walkerton Have Joint Golf Course Situated Midway Between Them.

Mr. James Hunter, professional of the Owen Sound Golf and Country Club, has just completed laying out the new Hanover Golf Club course, which occupied Wednesday and Thursday of this week, says Saturday's Owen Sound Sun-Times.

The course is situated midway between the towns of Hanover and Walkerton and thus is accessible to members of both of these places. It is a nine-hole course and is 2300 yards in length, and is very close to the Hanover-Walkerton road. A farm of 50 acres was purchased for the purpose of the course and every available piece of ground is being utilized. The ground is said to be more suitable to golf course purposes than the Owen Sound course but it is not as long as the local links.

The new golf club will likely be called the Hanover Golf and Country Club, but it will draw nearly half of its members from Walkerton. It is expected that there will be sixty members from Walkerton and one hundred from Hanover, and the course will be ready for use next May.

The originators of the scheme are the Messrs. Brunt Bros., of Hanover who purchased the farm and have been promoting the proposition.

The new golf club will be a decided advantage to the Owen Sound Golf and Country Club as interclub matches will be staged quite easily.
