#### BOLSHEVIST EDUCATION

(From The New York Independent.)

The Living Age recently printed some articles from the Pravda of Moscow, a Russian Communist daily, describing a competition among Communist schools, which illustrate the ideals of the Bolshevik educational program. The following anecdote is characteristic:

The Home for Children of Red Army Soldiers in Kremenchug, in charge of Comrade Vrona, is considered one of the best in the Province. The children attend to their work very diligently, draw and study music; games too are fairly well organized. The change in the outlook of the children is tremendous! The children are ashamed to say, "As true as there is a God!" They have become anti-Christians and infidels.

Here is a little scene from a recitation conducted by Comrade Vrona during the "political lesson":  
"Uncle Pania, is there a God?"  
"We'll talk about that some other time."  
"But tell us now, just the same!"  
"No there is no God. All those who believe there is a God raise their hands."  
There are three, four, seven and ten hands raised and then lowered again.  
"Now those who are against God."  
Quickly a forest of hands rises. There is a lusty shout of "Hurrah! God has lost out."

We have been busy lately, and have not been able to devote much time to an analysis of Bolshevik educational ideals, but somehow we cannot help feeling that the picture presented above loses charm.

### MORE PROTECTION NEEDED BY FARMERS

London Free Press Answers Its Western Namesakes' Arguments Regarding Conditions.—Free Trade Injurious.—Would Wipe Out Farmers' Protection on Fruits and Other Farm Products.

The Manitoba Free Press, which worships at the shrine of free trade, has seized on the fact that the Western Ontario United Boards of Trade have made a survey of conditions in the fourteen counties which form Western Ontario and have discovered that agricultural conditions might be improved and that there is much waste and idle land, which could be put to work to make an argument in favor of its pet theory. The Free Press sums up:

"The Canadian farmer for fifty years has been selling his products abroad in an open market and buying at home in a protected one. For several generations, even pre-supposing tremendous industrial activity in Canada, this country will be a great exporter of agricultural produce. It cannot be anything else. Keep the old policy up long enough and mixed farming and all the advice in the world will not enable the Canadian farmer to make such a living that his sons and daughters will want to stay on the land. The new policy of cheaper living for the producer is worth trying out."

That the agricultural industry during the past few years in Western Ontario, along with the rest of the continent, has been passing through a serious period of depression is undoubted. There is also no question that there has been a strong trend from the city to the country, but that the policy of protection has anything to do with this condition, or that the adoption of free trade in Canada would remedy the situation, is a fallacy which The Manitoba Free Press would have hard work convincing the farmers of Western Ontario.

Every economist of repute is in agreement that the trouble with agriculture from the standpoint of prices has been largely due to the time-honored law of supply and demand. There has been a temporary overproduction of farm agricultural products. On the other hand, there is a restricted market. Europe has been in such financial and economic chaos that that continent where Canada, as well as the United States, sells its surplus products, has been unable to buy as in the past. There is not the demand there was years ago. The natural result of such conditions has been depressed prices. Fortunately, there are signs of better times in Europe and already purchases of goods are heavier, while prices are rising.

While world conditions unfortunately fix prices, yet the farmers of Western Ontario are far from dependent upon Europe for their market. The hundreds of thriving industrial towns and cities of Ontario form the backbone of their markets. Western Ontario would not be covered with the magnificent farms which dot this peninsula, no matter which way one drives, if these places were forced to the wall, which would certainly happen if the tariff was wiped out. The Western Ontario farmer, if he had to depend solely upon Europe or the foreign markets to sell his produce, would soon find himself in a desperate position.

One thing that the Ontario farmer is suffering from today is the lack of sufficient protection against the American agriculturist. He is meeting in many lines, such as fruits and vegetables, unfair competition from the south. Many of our products are almost barred from the United States by the high tariff. Presumably, if the tariff is wiped out on industrial lines, the modest tariff now existing on agricultural goods would also go. It would spell ruin to fruit growers, poultry raisers, dairymen and truck gardeners. Free trade, such as is advocated by the Manitoba Free Press, as a panacea for the farmers

of Canada, would be disastrous to manufacturers, business men and farmers in Ontario.

There are many reasons for the depopulation of rural communities, none of which has anything to do with the tariff. Machinery is responsible to a large extent. One man will do as much work today as five or ten men fifty years ago. There is the lure of city life and the difficulty of securing farm help. However, one of the chief causes in Western Ontario has been the drain to Western Canada for the past twenty-five years. As The Manitoba Free Press should well know, Western Canada has literally thousands of Huron and Bruce County old boys, as well as from every other county in this peninsula. Their places have never been filled, as the immigration stream has flown past Western Ontario to Western Canada. What the Western Ontario United Boards of Trade propose to do is to co-operate in a campaign of publicity as to the advantages of Western Ontario in order to divert British farmers of capital to this district to take the place of the great loss we have suffered from the thousands of men who have gone West to help open up and build up that great country.

#### ADVERTISING FOILS SWINDLERS

Men who engineered an outstanding fraud in Canada and the United States put forward an argument to their prospective victims from whom they later collected thousands of dollars, that they operated economically because they did not advertise.

The reason for absence of advertising was the cause of the losses of those whom they swindled. Had they advertised it would have been pointed out that the price asked for the product was beyond all reason and that people whose names were used to promote the fraud had no knowledge that they were being so utilized. Advertising would have prevented a gigantic swindle. Those despoiled have had a striking example of how valuable advertising really is.

The public knows that the business that advertises is placing its cards on the table. It has nothing to conceal. The people read advertising because they know it is their protection against the worker in the dark. Eight reasons for newspaper advertising are recounted from an article in a Southern newspaper, as follows:
