The Road To Better Health

What Are Your Baby's Playthings?

Are you careless about leaving pins, safety-pins, coins, buttons, corks of other small objects where babies or small children can get hold of them?

Dr. Russell S. Rowland of Detroit, says that cases in which such objects are swallowed or sucked into the air passages are more common than is generally supposed. Such accidents are often readily recognized because of a fit of choking or strangling occurring after a foreign body is known to have been placed in the mouth.

But it sometimes happens that babies or small children aspirate small objects into the windpipe and that no one knows about it. The symptoms at the time of the accident may not be noticed or are soon forgotten. After a period of apparent freedom from trouble, symptoms resembling those of certain diseases may develop, according to Rowland.

Other Diseases Suspected
 He states that croup, diphtheria,

asthma, pneumonia, tuberculosis and some less common diseases have been suspected when the trouble was caused by a foreign body lodged in the windpipe, bronchial tubes or lungs. Objects lodged in the esophagus for any length of time may cause ulceration which is dangerous.

Attention is called to the danger of babies playing with powder-boxes and spilling some of the powder on the face. It may get into the bronchial tubes and lungs and cause serious trouble, or even result in death.

Dr. Chevalier Jackson of Philadelphia says that about 90 per cent. of the cases of this kind are due to carelessness that is avoidable. Extreme care should be exercised to keep objects of such size that are easily put into the mouth away from babies and small children. The bad habit of putting things into the mouth should be corrected as soon as possible.

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HEALTH QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Neuritis
 Mrs. C. E. E. writes: "For over a year I have had a pain in one arm and shoulder. Different doctors have told me that I have neuritis, but I do not get any permanent relief. What causes neuritis? Is there any cure for it?"

Reply
 Neuritis seems to have many different causes. The list includes: Infections of the teeth, tonsils, sinuses, appendix, gall bladder and pelvis; diseases such as diabetes, anemia, tuberculosis, syphilis, and Bright's Disease; chronic poisoning from lead, arsenic, alcohol, and tobacco; and the effects of strains, injuries or pressure on the nerves.

The way to cure lies in finding and removing the cause. This may require a careful examination including laboratory tests of the blood and urine and X-ray examinations.

Has A Floating Cartilage.
 A. M. writes: "Every little while my right knee gets 'locked' and causes me a lot of pain. I have been told that I have a floating cartilage in the knee joint. Is there any way that this can be cured without an operation?"

Reply
 The only way that the cartilage can be removed is by operation.

Chalazion
 Mrs. W. B. M. writes: "Our three year old son has a swelling on one of his eyelids. When it first started we thought it was a sty. It has gradually gotten larger but does not seem to hurt him. Is there anything we can put on to take it down?"

Reply
 The eyelid contains some small glands, the ducts of which open on to the lid margin. If one of these ducts becomes stopped up, the retained secretion results in a distention of the gland, which causes the
