LIME WILL AID CLOVER

It Enables the Plant to Cope With the Winter

Acid Phosphate Good for Clover and Alfalfa—A Great Root Farmer—Nitrate of Soda Helps in Cold Springs—Poultry Pointers.

Did your clover kill out in the spring? If it did, you had better write the Department of Chemistry, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, for directions for taking a sample of your soil to discover the reason.

Reports from some districts this year show a good deal of winter wheat and clover killed out, states the Department of Chemistry, O.A.C. This is highly undesirable, and can be prevented by the use of lime and acid phosphate applied with the crop on which the clover is seeded. In some cases lime is not necessary, for the soil is not acid; but where acidity occurs lime is very essential. Phosphorus is a great root farmer, and it is the strong deep-rooted clover and wheat plant that withstands the alternate freezing and thawing of spring weather.

Result of Lime Phosphate Experiments. In answer to a circular sent out last spring to the twenty-five co-operative experimenters handling our Lime Phosphate Experiment, the majority report that the clover on the half acre which received crushed limestone and acid phosphate in the fall of 1922 is in perfect shape, while in many cases the untreated section did not winter nearly as well and in one or two cases will have to be ploughed up.

If seeding is done with spring grain it is good business to use acid phosphate at the rate of at least 300 pounds per acre, and preferably 400. If the soil is acid, lime is also necessary to give a strongly-rooted clover and alfalfa which will carry it over the first winter, the most critical period of the life of the plant.

Nitrate of Soda Helps in Cold Springs. In such a season as the spring of last year, cold and wet, the greatest need of the plant is for nitrates, says the Department of Chemistry, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. The ground will be so cold and wet that it takes a long time to warm up, and as a result bacterial activity is at a low ebb. As a result no nitrates are formed in the soil, and plants cannot make vegetative growth.

To correct this and enable the plant to get away to a good start, apply nitrate of soda one hundred pounds per acre at once. If bought in lots of several hundred pounds it can be obtained at a reasonable price, and its benefit is almost certain. Do not, however, apply if heavy rain threatens, as it is soluble and will be lost by washing.

Another benefit which will be derived is that the nitrate of soda dissolves in the soil water and soaks down into the soil. The roots go after it, and hence the result is a deeper rooted plant more able to withstand the period of drought which so often follows a wet seed time.

Poultry Pointers. An ointment of lard and kerosene is a good one for scaly legs. Nothing will more quickly make scrubs of your stock than scrub treatment.

The best tonics you can give your stock are fresh air, exercise and a variety of foods. It is usually the best policy to keep the hens shut up on cold, rainy days. They are better inside than out during such weather.

"Bad luck" is nothing more than a penalty for mismanagement. Before you begin to complain, it would be better to investigate.

Fowls are naturally of a hardy nature. They can be kept so by good care and breeding only from the strongest and most vigorous specimens each year.

The poultry building should not be so wide that the rays of the sun can not reach the back of the interior of the house. Otherwise it will be damp. Fourteen feet is a convenient width. Chickens mites do not feed to any great extent upon other hosts when chickens are at hand. They are carried about chiefly by the interchange of poultry and in crates and boxes in which fowls are shipped.

Poultry raising is similar to farming in that it is not so much the number of acres owned, but the number properly handled that gives the profits. Small, well cared for flocks always bring the best returns.

The hen's greatest profit-producing period is the first and second years, and unless a hen is an especially good breeder she should be disposed of at the end of her second laying season and before starting to molt.

Boys and girls should be encouraged to start in the poultry business. It requires little money to invest, and the current expenditure may be reduced in part by utilizing farm and home wastes. If the project begins with a laying flock the return begins early, especially by supplementing the food supply of the home.

Egg Production at O. A. C. The average egg production of the one thousand pullets that were trapped for the year was 168 eggs each. We are trying to improve the strain in size of body, size of eggs and color, rather than increasing the number of eggs. Five pens of ten pullets each were placed in laying competitions. The fifty birds averaged slightly above 190 eggs each. The high bird of those in the contests was 263 eggs, and the high bird of those on the plant was 296 eggs.—Prof. W. R. Graham, O. A. C., Guelph.

A Shoe Protection

This applies particularly to children as it is almost impossible to see that they have rubbers on every shoe it is necessary.

You will find that by melting some mutton fat together with again as much bees-wax and painting it on children's shoes while hot, that their shoes are practically waterproof. Especially, with two coats.

How to Test Canned Goods

1. Be sure cap shows line of resin around it; should be the same as seen on seam at side of can.

2. Press bottom of can. If goods are perfect there will be no rattle to the tin.

3. Do not use any goods where you can see rust around the cap on the inside head of can.

A Pretty Christmas Salad

Apples, 10 cents worth of cinnamon drops, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup water.

Method: Core and peel apples, cut into small pieces, add sugar and cinnamon drops, and water.

Simple Tomato Soup

I have previously given a recipe for a real home made tomato soup; but on such big days as Christmas and New Year's, a good soup easily made is the main requirement.

Method: Empty any canned tomato soup into a pan; stir tiny pinch of baking soda into this. Use can as measure, take twice the amount of milk as can holds. This will be a delicious cream soup.

Stuffed Dates and Salted Nuts

Both are toothsome additions to a Christmas Candy Box or a Christmas dinner.

Method for Dates: 1. Make a fondant of confectioner's sugar, cream, butter and a little vanilla. Remove pit and fill cavity with this fondant.

Method for Almonds or Pecans: If salting almonds, always blanch first. Pour any good oil into a frying pan; have it very hot. Pour in nuts—stir constantly until browned. Have a brown paper spread out on

BAKING HINTS

Hint for Removing Cake Remove cake on to a piece of oiled paper or tissue paper. If cake sticks to this, a little warm water will easily remove paper.

Sour Milk Cornbread 2 eggs, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup sour milk, 1-3 cup butter, Pinch Salt, 1 cup corn meal, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking soda.

Method: Beat eggs-add sugar and salt, then corn meal and flour; next dissolve soda in milk, add this to other ingredients, and, last of all, melted butter. Pour in greased pan and bake.

Rules for Baking Custards

1. Do not beat eggs too light. 2. Heat milk and add gradually. 3. Custards are much better when strained. 4. Strain before cooking. 5. Set in a pan of water while baking.
