FARMERS' INSTITUTES FOUNDER DEAD AT OTTAWA

Dr. James Mills, Former President of the O.A.C. Passed Away Last Week At Advanced Age. One of the outstanding figures in the educational and agricultural fields of Ontario died at his residence at Ottawa on Thursday of last week in the person of Dr. James Mills, L.L.D. He was 84 years of age.

Dr. Mills was born near Bondhead, Simcoe County, in 1844, was of Irish parentage and received little education until 24 years of age. He graduated from Victoria University and was later headmaster of the Brantford Collegiate Institute.

Under his presidency, the O.A.C. developed and grew until it gained an international reputation. Dr. Mills undoubtedly laid the foundation of agricultural development and progress throughout the Dominion.
