ANIMAL SUPPORT COST

What It Takes to Carry Sheep, Swine and Cattle

The Value of the Manure Must Be Credited—Cost of Milk and Butter—Fat Production—Salt and Water for Sheep.

Maintenance of Sheep.

Investigational work with sheep, conducted by the Department of Animal Husbandry at the Ontario Agricultural College, gave for cost of maintenance of the farm flock the following figures: Winter ewe lambs, \$4.49 each; winter breeding ewes, \$5.50 each.

Investigational work in fattening lambs was continued, and the results showed for last year that it would have paid better to market the lambs in the autumn than to finish them in the pens, the lambs all showing a loss when strict account of feed was kept.

Maintenance of Swine.

In investigational work with swine it was found that in wintering brood sows on a narrow, nutritive ratio produced largely from concentrated feeds, the cost was fifteen cents per day for mature sows, whereas with groups using more roughage the cost was reduced to eight and nine cents per day.

An extensive experiment with commercial hog feeds versus home-grown feeds showed that under average farm conditions none of the commercial hog feeds used was as economical as a well-balanced mixture produced on the farm.

Maintenance of Beef Cattle.

Cost investigations conducted with beef cattle gave the following interesting figures: The average cost of feeding breeding beef cows in the College herd was 15.9 cents per day. The cost of labor per cow per day was 7 cents. The value of the manure per cow per day was 5.8 cents, and the cost of bedding per cow per day was 1.9 cents. The total feed and labor cost per cow per year, after deducting the value of manure, was \$69.35. The average weight of beef calves born during the year 1922 was 77.33 pounds.

Cost of Maintenance of Herd Sire.

In the cost of maintenance investigations conducted with the herd sires, the following figures were obtained: For the Shorthorn herd sire, \$129.60 per year was required; for the Hereford, \$101.76; for the Angus, \$107.88; and for the Jersey, \$86.26. The bulls were of different ages and of different weights, so no breed comparison can be drawn. The figures indicate that it really costs something to maintain a herd sire, and that the man who maintains such an animal for the use of various cow owners is entitled to a larger fee than he usually demands.

Cost of Maintenance of Dairy Cattle.

The cost of maintenance for dry cows and helpers was shown to be \$8.60 per month. Some work was also done in an attempt to discover a satisfactory method of handling veal calves from dairy cows. The results show that dairy calves for veal should be marketed at the earliest possible age at which the market will accept them. It was also found that to make satisfactory veal while milk was necessary.

Cost of Milk and Butter Fat Production.

In investigational work with dairy cattle conducted at the Ontario Agricultural College to show the comparative economy of milk production and butter-fat production with the different breeds, it was found that the Holsteins produced milk at twenty-three cents less per hundredweight than did the Ayrshires, but in producing a pound of butter-fat there was only .03 cent difference. It was found that there was very little difference in the cost of production of Ayrshires and Holsteins, and that on milk production it cost more with Jerseys, but they (the Jerseys) produced butter-fat a little cheaper than did the other two breeds.—Dept. of Extension, O. A. College, Guelph.

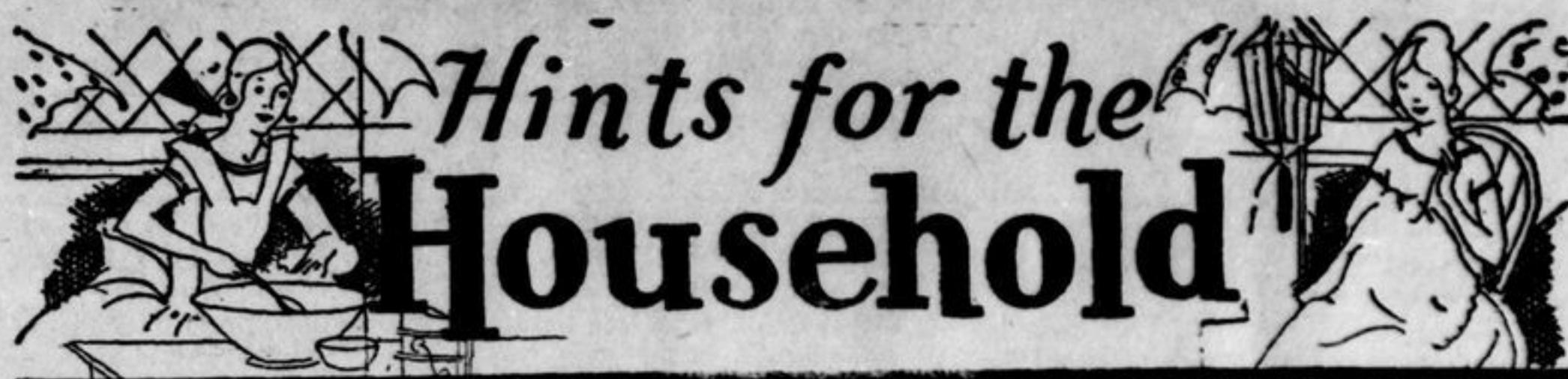
Salt and Water for Sheep.

During the winter when the snow is available, and especially where a liberal supply of roots is being fed, the flock will not suffer a great deal if water is not given, says the Department of Animal Husbandry, Ontario Agricultural College. At the same time sheep will drink more or less water if it is to be had, and if at all convenient it will pay to provide it even in the winter. After the ewes have lambed in the spring, and during the summer while on grass, an abundant supply of clean, fresh water should be at hand. Especially during the long, hot days of summer the sheep will drink freely, and the health and comfort of the flock demands that it be available.

Salt should be before the flock at all times during the year. A box or trough set up in the pen during the winter, or in the field while on pasture, in which there is always a supply, will assure the owner that his flock is always well provided with salt.

Storing Potatoes.

If potatoes are grown only for home use the crop is usually stored in the cellars of the houses or of the barns. Occasionally potatoes are stored in pits. When the crop is grown commercially, however, it is generally placed in a potato storage cellar erected for the purpose. In all cases it is important to store only well sorted, sound, clean, dry potatoes and to keep them constantly in a dry, cool, dark and well ventilated place. The temperature usually recommended for the best results is from 33 degrees F. to 35 degrees F.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Christmas Dinner

What to serve and how to get it and have the household run smoothly on Christmas Day is uppermost in the mind of every housewife.

To be sure, one always thinks of Turkey during the holidays. But why, if turkeys are dreadfully high, and if the pocketbook funds are low, why have turkey on Christmas Day?

A simple menu is:

- Fruit Cocktail (can be fixed ahead of time).
Roast chicken (can be stuffed ahead of time).
Gravy.
Mashed potatoes.
Baked onions.
Canned tiny peas.
Jellied vegetable salad.
Ice cream and cake or pie.

A Quick Way to Clean Currants

Place dried currants in a collar with a heaping teaspoon of flour. Set collar on a newspaper, rub the currants lightly. The flour and stems will go through the collar, and the currants will be left perfectly clean.

Care of Silk Stockings

Wash silk stockings in a luke warm suds after each wearing. Rinse well. In this way they will last much longer, as it is perspiration that rots them.

Christmas Sherbet

1 cup sugar.

- 1/2 cup water.
1 tablespoon gelatin.
2 cups loganberry juice (1 can).
1/2 cup (cold) water.
1 tablespoon lemon juice.
1 cup orange juice.
Method: Cook the sugar and 1/2 cup water together for ten minutes after it begins to boil.
Soak 1 tablespoon gelatin in the 1/2 cup of cold water. When dissolved, add to the syrup.
Then, add loganberry, lemon and orange juice. Freeze.

Raspberry Whip

- 2 large tablespoons raspberry jam.
3 large tablespoons currant jelly.
2 egg whites beaten stiff.
2 tablespoons of sugar.
Method: Beat the egg whites stiff. Add jam, jelly and sugar. Mix well. Chill. Serve with lady fingers in pretty glasses.

New Gelatin Salad

- 6 small sweet pickles, sliced thin.
1/2 can of sliced pineapple.
1 package of lemon jello.
12 blanched almonds.
Method: Add lemon jello to 1 pint (2 cups) boiling water. When this cools and commences to thicken, add other ingredients. Pour into a mold or individual molds and put in ice box. When stiff and chilled, serve on lettuce leaves with mayonnaise dressing.

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GREY COUNTY MOTORIST KILLED AT MARKDALE

Heavy Snow Responsible for Death of A. C. Rae of Harkaway.

An accident fraught with fatal results occurred in Markdale on Thursday of last week when the P. E. afternoon train arriving at Markdale at 4:14 o'clock struck an automobile owned and driven by C. Rae of Harkaway. Mr. Rae, accompanied by his son, was driving west on Main Street, going into Glenelg Township on business. Owing to a rather heavy snowfall at the time, neither occupant of the car saw the approaching train or heard the whistle or the electric bell which is installed at the crossing until they were so close that it was impossible to stop the car because of the slippery condition of the road. Knowing that an impact was inevitable, Mr. Rae swung the car to the left. Unfortunately, the rear end skidded too far, resulting in the last coach of the train catching the back of the car, driving it against the fence and platform, crumpling it like matchwood. The driven and his son were hurt. They were taken to Joseph Dennison's, where Mr. Rae died from shock shortly after his arrival.

The late Mr. Rae farmed on the Town line of Holland and Euphrasia. During late years he assisted in the co-operative store in Markdale. Coroner Dr. Bibby of Flesherton was notified of the death of Mr. Rae immediately after he had passed away, and on his arrival in Markdale, ordered an inquest to be held, which takes place tomorrow, the 19th inst., at Markdale.
