CONTROL COCKROACHES

A Reliable Method of Getting Rid of These Pests

Sodium Fluoride Will Do the Job—It Kills Both by Contact and the Mouth—How to Apply—Hot Flies—Fixed Proportions.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

The kitchens in many restaurants, hotels and other institutions are so infested with cockroaches that if patrons could see them they would leave the place in disgust. Bakershop are also much troubled with these insects.

Control Is Not Difficult. In spite of their commonness control is not difficult. Sodium fluoride, a white powder, will kill any that come in contact with it. The writer, however, prefers to use a mixture of equal parts of sodium fluoride and cornstarch, as being superior to the fluoride alone. This mixture costs only about 50c a pound, and a pound will treat once a very large kitchen and usually be sufficient for all the treatments for an ordinary private house.

The method of applying is to put the mixture into a can with a perforated lid, or into a salt-cellar, and then dust it moderately heavily along the floor beneath the water pipes and sinks, on the window sills, in the back part of the shelves of cupboards, and any other place frequented by the cockroaches.

Sodium Fluoride Kills Two Ways. The substance kills both by contact and by being taken into the mouth. It apparently gets into the mouth by the roaches cleaning their feet and body to remove the powder when they happen to run over it.

A small dust gun or bellows, costing about \$1.50, is an excellent thing to apply the powder with, and is much superior to the dusting can, as it enables a person to blow the substance into cracks and crevices where the insects may be hiding and where they could not be reached by the can.

How to Prepare for Treatment.

Before each treatment sweep the room well, and then leave the powder undisturbed for several days. Sweep up again and make another application. This may have to be repeated several times, and each time care should be taken to discover, if possible, overlooked areas and treat them. Usually two or three dustings will destroy almost all the cockroaches, even in a large institution, but sometimes it is so difficult to find all the hiding places that several applications will be necessary. All that is required, however, to eradicate the pest is care and perseverance.

That the powder does kill the cockroaches is treatment; for in a day's time numerous cockroaches will be found dead here and there over the floor.

The above treatment is the cheapest the writer knows, and much more effective than any spray that can be given, because it remains active as long as left on the floor, whereas the sprays are only effective at the time of application, and only if they hit the insects.—J. L. Caesar, O. A. College, Guelph.

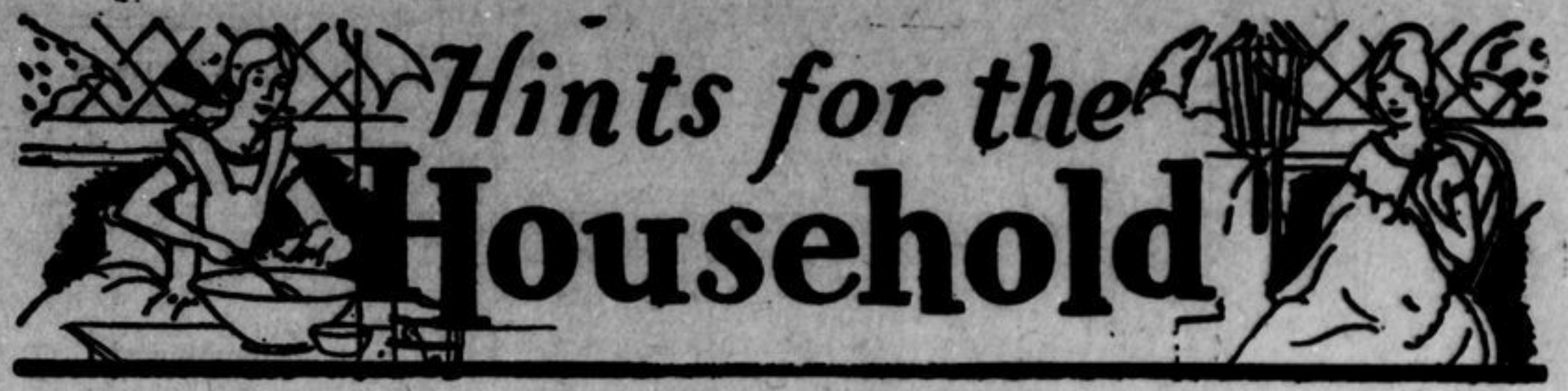
Bot Flies.

Measures should be taken to prevent horses becoming infested with the larvae of bot flies by protecting them from the egg laying attack of the parent fly. The clipping of the long hairs from the region of the head, breast, shoulders and legs affords some protection in that it reduces the probability of the fly being able to attach its eggs. The areas where the egg laying fly usually deposits her eggs should be frequently soaked with oil or grease. This prevents the eggs from adhering to the hair. Pieces of cotton or cheesecloth fastened to the bridle and harness in such a manner as to cover the under surface of the jaws, the breast and forearms affords some protection and reduces greatly the possibility of the horse wintering a stomach full of bot larvae and suffering in consequence of such. A little attention to what may seem trivial to many makes the difference between the horses being thrifty and hidebound. Swat the bot fly or at least prevent it from carrying out its destructive work.—L. Stevenson, O. A. College, Guelph.

Fixed Proportions.

There are a number of fixed proportions used in all recipes, and the following are standard: One-half as much liquid as flour for muffin and cake batters. One-third as much liquid as flour for soft doughs, as for biscuit. One-fourth as much liquid as flour for stiff doughs, as for bread. One-third to one-half as much butter as sugar for all butter cakes. One to one and a half teaspoonful of baking powder to a cupful of flour for batters or doughs. One-third as much shortening as flour for pastry. One teaspoonful of soda to one pint of sour milk.

The first consideration is to supply plenty of pure water for the hog lots. This is as important as good feeding. Save the mangels for the calves and young stock. COOKING HINTS

Pineapple Salad Dressing Wonderful for Fruit Salad. A good way to use up juice. 1 1/2 tablespoons butter. 1 1/2 cup sugar. 1 tablespoon flour. 2 eggs. Juice 1 large can pineapple.

Method: Cream the butter and sugar; add the flour; add the eggs, well beaten. Then heat the pineapple juice and add gradually to the mixture. Cook altogether until thick. Takes about 3 minutes over flame. Stir constantly. Cook longer in a double boiler. When cool add 1/2 pint bottle cream (whipped). This makes enough salad for 12.

BAKING HINTS

Baked Lima Beans and Pork 1 pound of dried lima beans. 1 1/2 teaspoon of mustard. 2 tablespoons of molasses. 1 onion. 10c worth of salt pork. Method: Soak the beans over night. Boil until almost tender. (Pour off liquid and boil again.) Add salt, mustard, molasses, onion chopped fine, brown sugar if desired, also water if dry, add pork and bake an hour. Have well browned.

Chocolate Pie

2 heaping tablespoons of cocoa. 2 heaping tablespoons of cornstarch. 3/4 cup sugar. 2 eggs or yolks of 2 eggs. Little salt. 2 cups milk. Vanilla. Method. Mix the cocoa and sugar well. Make a paste of cocoa, sugar and little of the milk. When smooth, add remainder of milk. Heat. When warm, add cornstarch dissolved in a little water. Then add eggs or yolks slightly beaten. Add this slowly. If cooked over flame, stir constantly. Cook until thick enough to hold shape, take off fire. Add vanilla; mix well. Pour into a baked pastry shell. Pour ready to serve, top with cream beaten stiff and sweetened to taste. The cream is really tastier used with this pie than meringue.

Mousse

This is the easiest and nicest dessert one can have during the freezing months. Chocolate Mousse for a party: 4 bottles of whipping cream (whipped stiff). 3 egg whites (beaten stiff). 1 cup confectioners sugar. 1 1/2 cups sugar. 1 cup water. 1 square of chocolate.

Method: Whip cream stiff. Whip eggs stiff. Add sugar to stiff egg whites. Then add to cream. Have ready a syrup of sugar, water and chocolate which has been cooled, add to cream and beaten eggs. Pack and freeze as mousse.

Easy Mousse

Fine for a small number of people. 1/2 pint bottle whipping cream. Flavoring. Method: Whip cream stiff, add sugar and flavoring. Put in mold, pack in snow or place pan outside on a shady window sill. Chocolate, pineapple, peach, raspberry, vanilla, strawberry or strawberry jam, maple, and marshmallow are a few of the simplest and best flavors.

How to Make Lid Secure for Freezing

Take a narrow strip of clean, white cloth, melt some grease. Dip cloth in grease, place this around place where cover joins. Press down tight.

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HOW TO SAVE COAL

If you live indoors most of the time and do not take proper precautions as to the conditions of the air therein, your home may be designated as a miniature "Death Valley." In the average house which is heated artificially, there is a great absence of moisture, which is absolutely necessary for health and a great conservator of coal. It has been demonstrated that living rooms heated by steam to a temperature of 72 degrees contains a relative humidity as low as 23 degrees, which is as dry as Death Valley. There is a tendency to overheat as we feel chilly when there is a lack of humidity. This is due to the fact that dry atmosphere causes rapid evaporation upon the surface of our bodies and has a cooling effect. We may therefore feel as though we require more heat while the temperature of the room may be over 70. The human body is therefore a very unreliable instrument to depend upon for judging such subtle things as the temperature of rooms, and a reliable thermometer should be in every home. It is the house fuel-using guide and is to the coal consumer what the speedometer is to the autoist. If we can evaporate enough water indoors to raise the humidity to 50 or 75 per cent, we can burn much less coal and reduce the temperature to 65. This would not only be more comfortable but more healthful.
