Radio Topics

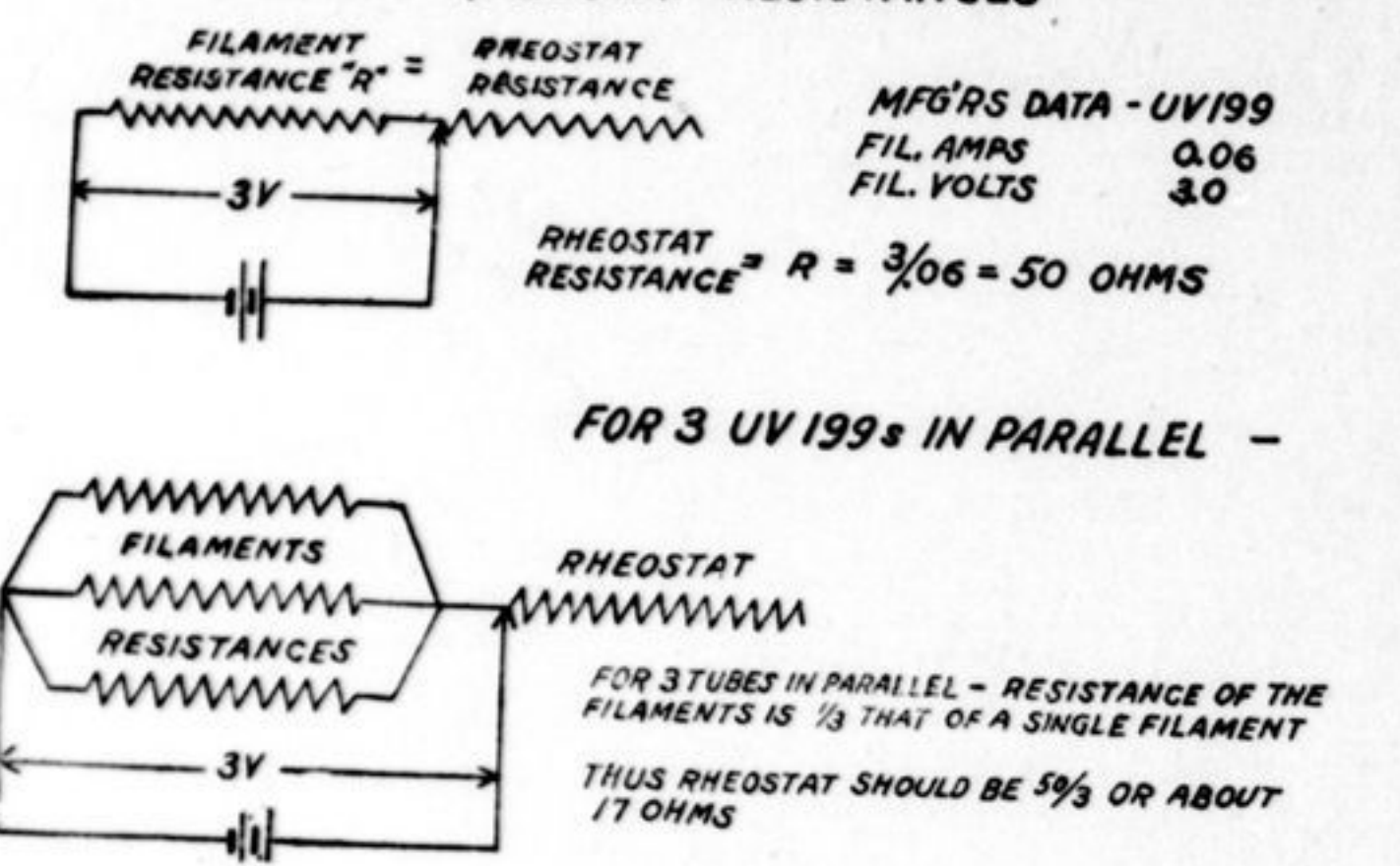
Selection of Proper Tubes and Rheostats

When the radio fan starts to build himself a receiving set, one of the first problems which confronts him is that of choosing the type of tubes to be used. And right along in this same line is the problem of what rheostats to use.

The standard tubes which are most used are the Radiotrons and occasionally the Western Electric tubes. The Radiotrons are the WD11, WD12, UV199, UV200, UV201 and the UV201A. The Western Electric tubes mostly used are the VT1 and the VT2 types.

PROPER RHEOSTAT RESISTANCES



Exceptionally Good Tube
The UV199 is an especially good tube for use as a radio frequency amplifier because of its low internal capacity. Also its filament consumes but 0.18 watts which is lower than for any other tube. In these last two respects the UV199 is better than any of the other tubes mentioned in the above list. The WD12 tubes are, in the writer's opinion at least, superior to the UV199s for audio frequency amplification.

Former Well-Known Durhamite Passed Away Last Week.

Last Saturday's Toronto papers contained notice of death in that city of Mr. George Wilson Woodland, president of Newsome and Gilbert, stationers, and a former well-known resident of Durham.

Mr. Woodland was born in Ireland 63 years ago when an infant, came to Canada with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Joshua Woodland. For many years the elder Woodland conducted a general store in town, and was later joined by his son, whom he took into partnership. About 25 years ago, the subject of this sketch removed to Toronto where he entered the stationery business, for many years travelling on the road in this line for Newsome and Gilbert, Limited, subsequently becoming a member of the firm. At the time of his death, he was president of the institution.
