LISTOWEL ONE GOAL UP WHEN FINAL BELL RANG

Schutz was good, but marred his effectiveness by two trips to the penalty box, a place where few hockey matches are won where few hockey players play a great deal, and the heavy bodying of Listowel stopped him. He is a smooth stick-handler, but the close-checking of his opponents prevented him from breaking through.

Buschlen is one of the hardest-workers on the team and a fast-skater. He is a much better puck-carrier than he was at the first of the season. The second period was the disastrous one for the local kids in the matter of goal-getting, they securing but one lone tally, while the Listowel outfit bagged the twice-three times, making the second-period score 4-1. Their second counter this period, however, was a lucky one being secured from a scramble in front of the goal, the puck rolling into the net.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS Something to Remember While making a mustard plaster, mix an egg white with the mustard. This will prevent plaster from causing a blister.

COOKING HINTS (A Winter Dish) Stuffed Green Peppers 8 peppers. 1 cup cream sauce. 2 cups of diced meat or 2 cups of diced chicken.

Crab meat. Method: Chop crab meat. Mix with a little cream, salt and lemon. Cut each slice of bread in 3 pieces. Spread each slice with butter and brown in hot oven.

Canapes These are a nice addition to any meal. They are very tasty. Crab Meat Canapes Slice of bread. Butter. Parsley. Cream. Salt. Lemon.

Baking Hints Different Custard Pie 5 eggs. 6 tablespoons sugar. 1 pint milk. Lemon flavoring.

Banana Filling For Cake A Wonderful Dessert 1 cup mashed bananas. Juice of 1/2 lemon. 1/2 cup sugar.

Hard boiled eggs. Sardines. Lemon. A little horseradish if you have it. Method: Cut rounds of bread. Toast. Boil eggs hard.

How to Beat Eggs As you beat eggs, frequently raise the egg beater off the bottom of the bowl, but continue beating eggs. This allows the air to get into eggs, and they beat much quicker and lighter.
