CLUB ROOT RESISTANT TURNIPS

That some strains of turnips are resistant to club root is borne out by tests conducted by the Experimental Stations at Kentville, N. S., Charlottetown, P. E. I. and Nappan, N. S., according to W. W. Baird, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm at Nappan, N. S.

At Nappan, in 1922, six acres were sown with Monarch seed (home-grown) and two acres with Bangholm club root resistant seed, (obtained from the Charlottetown Station) on a field infected with club root. The six acres of Monarch yielded 2195.5 bushels or 365.9 bushels per acre. Of these, 295.6 bushels or 49.3 bushels per acre were not fit for use. Owing to the club root, 10 to 15 per cent of the plants never developed. The total loss on this field was more than 50 per cent. The two acres of Bangholm club root resistant yielded 694.5 bushels per acre and showed less than 2 per cent unfit for use. In 1923, four acres were again seeded with Monarch and two with Bangholm club root resistant seed, but on a new field not so badly infected with club root as the field used the previous year. The four acres of Monarch yielded 3357.6 bushels or 838.4 bushels per acre, while the two acres of Bangholm club root resistant yielded 1945 bushels or 922.5 bushels per acre. Fifty per cent of the Monarch roots were affected more or less with club root, while the Bangholm club root resistant were 2 per cent affected. In 1924, this test was repeated but on new land, and, as the season was unfavorable for club root development, all roots were free from infection.

In the variety test made in 1923, on infected soil, the following results were obtained: Bangholm Sludsgaard D. L. F. and Shepherd Swede No. 2056 (Denmark) no infection evident, Bangholm club root resistant Charlottetown 1.4 per cent, while the other 16 varieties ranged from 3.2 per cent to 46.7 per cent infection.

In 1923, one-half acre was planted out with disease-free roots for seed production which yielded at the rate of 800 pounds of seed per acre. The most of this seed was sold to farmers. Of the farmers receiving the seed, only one or two reported infected roots.

If, by careful selection, its resistant qualities are retained, this strain of club root resistant turnips should prove of great value to the farmers of Eastern Canada. In Nova Scotia alone, some 12,000 acres were seeded to roots in 1923. It is conservatively estimated that one-half that area is infected with club root. If seed of the club root resistant strain had been used, and the same increased yields secured as above recorded, there would have been an increased return to the farmers of Nova Scotia of over \$180,000 or \$31.65 per acre for 6,000 acres infected, if the roots were valued at 15 cents per bushel. During 1924, about 350 pounds of this seed was produced at Nappan, N. S. It will be for sale in limited quantities of 2 pounds per farmer at \$1 per pound. It is desired that farmers receiving this seed should save sufficient roots from which to grow their own seed and perhaps a surplus for sale.

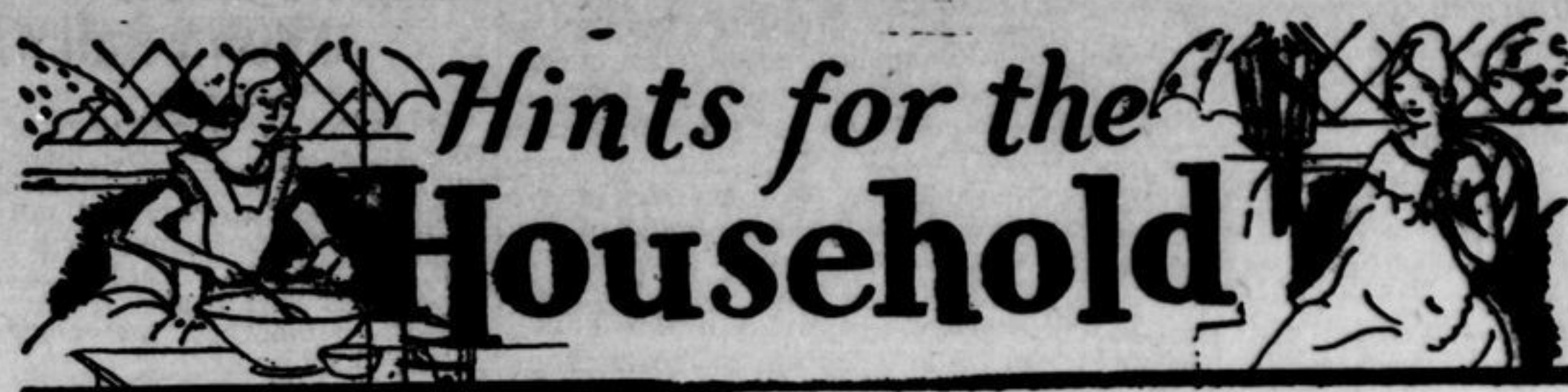

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To Wash Egg Dishes Always soak or rinse dishes that have contained egg in cold water before washing.

To Clean Wicker Furniture Wicker furniture can be scrubbed with hot water and soap. This really renews some of its freshness.

How To Clean Braid On Wool Middies Sponge with white soap and water. Then press. Maddy will look like new.

To Remove Perspiration Stains Make a solution of 1 teaspoon of ammonia to 1 quart of water. Soak stained garment in this solution for one hour. Then sponge stains with lemon juice. Rinse in warm water and wash in usual way.

COOKING HINTS

Tasty Ways For Left Over Meats Meat Chopped On Toast

Meat. Chop fine the "left over" meat. Heat with water, butter and seasoning. Make nice hot buttered toast.

Place heated chopped meat on each piece of toast. Garnish with something pretty.

Rice Balls 1 cup veal or pork. 2 cups boiled rice. 1 egg. Onion.

Method: Chop or grind veal, pork or both. Mix with rice, egg, onion, salt and pepper. Form in balls or flat cakes. Fry in skillet or deep fat.

Omelet

Make your favorite omelet. Be sure and add beaten whites of eggs last. Cook. Fold warm chopped meat into omelet when serving.

Cranberry and Date Marmalade

1 quart cranberries. 1 pound of dates. 2 cups of water. 2 cups of brown sugar.

Method: Wash cranberries. Stone dates. Add water, cook slowly together for twenty minutes. Press through a sieve—then add 2 cups brown sugar and cook about 15 minutes more.

AN AMERICAN DEFENSE

(London Free Press)

Even The Detroit Times, a Hearst publication, which is not noted for its friendliness to Canada, resents the attack which was made by Dr. Samuel S. Weyer in the pamphlet issued by the Smithsonian Institution against the Hydro-Electric Commission. The Times says:

Sir Adam Beck of Canada has a right to be indignant because the Smithsonian Institution, a branch of the United States Government, published a partisan attack upon the credit and financial soundness of Canada's greatest public enterprise, the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission.

The Smithsonian pamphlet carries the pseudo-scientific title "Niagara Falls, Its Power Possibilities and Preservation." It is written by a consulting engineer, Dr. Samuel Weyer, who makes his living working for the private gas and electric companies in the United States. Sir Adam charges that these interests inspired the Weyer attack.

It is disgraceful for the Smithsonian Institution to allow its name and its funds to be used to circulate falsehoods such as Sir Adam Beck proves upon the author of the Niagara Falls pamphlet.

This document, broadcast over the country, under Government frank, Sir Adam says, "contains misrepresentations designed to be injurious to the general welfare of a friendly nation." It is a direct attack upon public confidence in the \$200,000,000 bonds issued to raise money for the commission's plants. Millions of these bonds are in the hands of American investors.

It is much worse than that. It is paid-for propaganda against the principle of public ownership, issued in the disguise of an unbiased report to an official Government agency. The director of the Smithsonian should explain how it happened.

The people of Ontario, despite any attacks from the United States or from Canada, have the utmost confidence in Sir Adam Beck and the commission. They know what has been accomplished in a period of less than two decades, and they have the tangible evidence of the enormous saving which it has meant to the people of Ontario. If it were not for possibility of the effect upon the money market of such attacks, they are not even worth a reply on the part of Sir Adam.

THE O. T. A. AMENDMENT

(Toronto Mail and Empire)

In this issue, we publish a letter from Mr. George B. Nicholson, ex-member of Parliament for Algoma East, on the Ferguson Government's proposal to amend the Ontario Temperance Act so as to change the proof spirit content of beer from 2.5 per cent to 4.4 per cent. The cause of temperance has no stronger adherent than the writer of this letter. While personally he would prefer that the Act remain as it is, he gives the Government credit for conscientious dealing with the question "having regard to the desirability of permanently maintaining as far as possible the principles of the Ontario Temperance Act." He advises other prohibitionists to have similar faith in the good judgment until they see how the new plan works out. As he and most other reasonable men see it, the great evil that temperance forces have now to grapple with is the bootlegging business. If the sale of 4.4 per cent beer tends to reduce that evil, he is certain that good will result. Mr. Nicholson recognizes that a difficult situation has been produced by the outcome of the plebiscite, the total vote in favor of the O. T. A., exceeding that for Government control by only a narrow margin, and he believes that fair-minded men will consider that situation and give the Government support in its efforts to carry out the law. As her further points out, the enforcement of the O. T. A. is made more difficult by the unsympathetic attitude of the Customs Department at Ottawa.
