"The better, more edible kinds of are rapidly being depleted," says Edgar Cochrun of the Conservation Commission. "This is evident by the consideration of statistics in this department from 1891 through 1923.

"Only the lake trout appears to be holding its own, and this appearance is illusory, for the efficiency in taking it has greatly increased. Whitefish, that sold for an average price of five cents a pound in 1891. brought 20 cents in 1923. The whitefish product of 1891 was near 5,000 -000 pounds more than that of 1911 while the 1923 catch was 350,000 less than 1911. Herring, which had practically no value in 1870, brought the fishermen \$390,000 in 1911. Am increase of more than 100 per cent in the market price in 1923 would seem to be a great incentive for the taking of this species, yet the best efforts of the fishermen resulted in catch of 3,600,000 pounds, which is 8,000,000 less than 1911.
